A Joyful Start to 2025 in Early Learning

The year has begun with a wonderful sense of excitement and connection in our Early Learning Centre. We have been delighted to welcome so many new families into our community, and it has been our priority to ensure that every little girl feels safe, secure, and supported as she begins her journey at Wildy.

For the first three weeks, we as educators have focused on building trust, nurturing a strong sense of belonging, and creating an environment filled with play, joy, and friendship. Thoughtfully establishing our routines and learning environments has enabled us to be truly present with the children so that we can learn about their interests and build relationships that will make their learning meaningful. We know that when children feel safe and connected, they grow in confidence to explore, engage, and thrive.

While we can see each day that the girls are happy and flourishing, we wanted to hear directly from them. Their words offer a beautiful insight into how they are feeling and what they love about being at Wildy.

How does your heart feel when you come to Wildy?

Phoebe – "KindD—Dbecause I love Kevin the koala (a class teddy)."
Olivia W – "I feel love 'cause I feel like that in my life."
Morgan – "Good, because I love playing. I am a Mamie girl."
Florrie – "Good... because I get to see my teachers."
Kiara – "I feel like I want to play with friends."

Amelia – "I want to play with Kiara." Adelaide – "Good[]—[]I made something for my mumma... I make pictures for her all the time... unicorns and rainbows."

What's your favourite place to play at Wildy?

Phoebe – "To go outside and play in the sandpit."
Olivia – "Painting[]—[]because I love coming here."
Isla – "Draw with textas... because I like textas."
Florrie – "Jumping on the trampoline."

Who do you like spending time with here? What do you like to do together?

Olivia W- "Miss Sophie... playing puzzles.

Kiara... we like to play in the sandpit."

Can you show me something in Wildy that makes you smile?

Morgan - "Doing instruments."

Isla - "Seeing Miss Kaysee and doing yoga."

What is something special about Wildy that you don't have at home?

Reflecting on these responses, albeit captured quickly from the children and only from a selection, it is clear that they bring with them a deep sense of curiosity, creativity, and joy from their home environments, where their families, whom we honour as their first educators, provide rich learning experiences every day. Our role at Wildy is to extend this sense of belonging, to create opportunities for connection, and to support each girl as she develops her own identity and understanding of the world.

As we move forward through the term, we look forward to seeing how the children's learning journeys unfold — I the friendships they deepen, the discoveries they make, and the confidence they continue to build.

Welcome to 2025 and Verus

We are excited to introduce Verus, a new digital platform designed to enhance communication and engagement between our School and families. As part of our ongoing commitment to fostering a connected community, Verus offers an intuitive and userfriendly experience for parents and guardians to stay informed about their child's School experience.

If your daughter has an appointment during the day, it is important that you enter this via attendance on Verus. Students without parent consent will be delayed at the Front Office. It does not matter if your daughter is absent for the day or for a couple of weeks, you will need to add the absence via Verus.

We understand that transitioning to a new system can take time, and we are here to support you every step of the way. We encourage you to explore the features of Verus, as more detailed guidance and tips will be shared in the coming weeks.

The start of a new year is always an opportunity to reset and refocus. It is important that girls are wearing their summer uniform and hat to and from School. I have noticed that there are a number of students who are not wearing plain studs or sleeper earrings. Hoops are not to be worn to School.

International Service Vietnam trip

In December 2024, Summer and I attended a Round Square International Service trip (RSIS) to Vietnam, a 14-day experience that pushed us out of our comfort zones and allowed us to connect with people from around the world. We started in Hanoi, where we explored the city, visited local markets, and tried new foods. On the third day, we traveled to a small village near Mai Chau, where we spent 10 days working on community projects, such as building a dam and installing solar panels. We also visited the local primary school, playing games and bonding with the children, which was such a special experience.

Throughout the trip, we formed strong friendships with people from different countries and backgrounds. Working together on physically demanding projects and adjusting to a new environment helped us build a sense of teamwork and support, making the experience even more rewarding. Staying in homestays was also an eye-opening experience. The houses were built on stilts to prevent flooding and keep animals out. We slept on the top level while our hosts stayed below, and the floors were made of thin, flat bamboo. The trip ended with a boat tour of Ha Long Bay. Initially, we were nervous about meeting new people and being far from home, but this experience helped us adapt, build confidence, and embrace challenges. It was an unforgettable journey that shaped our perspectives and personal growth.


Another very special event took place in week 2, with the launch of our Mary Home House
