FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Instilling the Round Square Ideals

Our involvement with Round Square is something we are very proud of at Wilderness School, as it supports us in achieving our Wilderness mission: to enable every girl to be the best they can be throughout their life.

This week, both students and parents have had the chance to hear about our identity as a Round Square school, from those who are most closely involved. First, our student ambassadors held a Round Square Assembly on Monday. Then, at the Parents and Friends Association AGM on Wednesday night, Mrs Stephanie Andrews, Head of Global Learning, spoke about the value of being a Round Square School and how, through the lens of the Round Square ideals, and an emphasis on 'being' as well as 'doing', it will continue to support our students in becoming well-rounded, active and informed global citizens.

Just as our Wilderness values are embedded into the daily life of our school, the Round Square ideals (internationalism, democracy, environment, adventure, leadership and service) help to shape the way that students develop initiatives, complete projects and engage with the world. As the variety of the initiatives above shows, Round Square has proven a great framework for our students to develop a sense of belonging to a greater purpose—within our school, their local community and the world—with opportunities to give back and serve.

I am so pleased to see how the Round Square committee is growing in number each year, and in addition to our 2023 Round Square Representative, Claudia John (Year 12), we have also appointed ambassadors. A key aspect of our Learning That Matters framework is 'Global Consciousness'——"the capacity to examine local, global and intercultural issues, to understand and appreciate the perspectives and world views of others, to engage in open, appropriate and effective interactions with people from different cultures, and to act for collective wellbeing and sustainable development."

We feel fortunate to be one of two Round Square member schools in South Australia connected to a global network comprised of 230 schools, from 50 countries across six continents, whose actions and character match up to their stated values, that we can collaborate with, learn from and serve alongside as we develop Global Consciousness in each and every student.

This membership enables outstanding experiences, with students throughout the whole school taking part in a range of virtual and face-to-face conferences. Our Junior School girls have participated in virtual collaborations with fellow schools, such as Godspell College in Argentina and The Sagar School in India.

Last year, a small group of Year 10 and Year 11 students and staff travelled to Europe for the Round Square International Conference, and we plan to attend the next conference in 2024.

We also hope to offer our students the opportunity to take part in International Service Projects and exchanges, where they will be able to live out the Round Square ideals in another country and observe how these values and actions translate in another culture.

Collectively, these Round Square opportunities complement our ambition to grow each girls' character as they step into their identities as global citizens and embrace what they can offer to the world.

EARLY LEARNING

Rich Learning Opportunities in Routines

In my opinion, effective, purposeful, thoughtful and embedded routines significantly contribute to the attainment of success in one's adult life. They help to create calm in the chaos, organisation in our fast-paced life, healthy habits, predictability, safety and structure, and aid in the achievement of long-term goals. Routines free up our minds for the challenging work. This is the same in the classroom.

Learning and actively following routines form an enormous part of the first few weeks of term. Every part of our ELC routines has been carefully thought through and refined over time. Given their importance, these routines are explicitly taught, which takes time, great care and an abundance of patience... so much patience.

Not only do routines (such as arrivals, toileting, lining up, moving to and from specialist lessons, group times, rest times and mealtimes) give children a sense of security and safety due to their predictability and structure, but they have enormous potential for learning. Every single one of our daily routines helps to build the girls' self-confidence, sense of belonging, self-regulation and self-help skills. The girls have opportunities to help each other, and they learn how to listen, speak and behave in a group in a variety of settings. The girls learn to do so much for themselves simply because they know exactly what is expected and it is repeated each day. When this is implemented effectively, the girls are then free to learn so much more!

Overall, our routines contribute to the development of the girls' identity as Mamie girls,

Annie girls and as Wildy girls. These moments cannot be photographed for you because they are routine – almost invisible once embedded – and because they require our team to be present and one hundred percent engaged.

In writing this article, I aim to help you see the importance of routines in our educational program. It is to shine a light on an often overlooked or unnoticed part of our day and your day, yet something that is vital to success (in whatever way you define it). It is also to help you to understand that what you see on Seesaw is an incredibly small part of your daughter's education.

Lastly, and as equally as important, I must take the opportunity to thank our ELC educators. The calm, organised, positive learning environment they create does not happen by chance; it is developed intentionally over time and repeated with patience every day.



























JUNIOR SCHOOL

Wildlife Adventures at Cleland

Summer has certainly made its presence felt in the past two weeks, ensuring that our girls in Years 2 to 4 have enjoyed their Water Safety lessons even more than usual! The girls undertook lessons across four days in Week 4, travelling to the Aquatic Centre and participating in group lessons aimed at building their confidence and capacity to keep themselves safe in the water. Our Reception and Year 1 girls will, I am sure, also enjoy their lessons coming up in Week 7 of this term.

Outdoor Education

Outdoor Education is a valued and significant learning entitlement for girls at Wilderness and all girls from Mamies through to Year 9 have learning experiences in this area. In the ELC, our littlest girls enjoy incursions, with a greatly anticipated first excursion for our Annie girls. In the Junior School, the girls in Reception and Year 1 have two day experiences, with a different environmental focus for each one. In Year 2, the girls have a day experience and their first – and much awaited – overnight experience with their Zoo Snooze.

In Year 3, the girls have an exciting two-night camp to Aldinga, where they engage in nature play and activities with an Indigenous focus. Our Year 4 cohort attend an amazing camp at Douglas Scrub, where the entire camp experience is a journey into literature inspired by the novel Walking the Boundaries by Jackie French. Similarly, our Year 5 girls

have a literature-focussed camp with their first visit to our Outdoor Education campus, Crawford. The girls undertake a novel study of Colin Thiele's Storm Boy, before spending three nights in the region where the novel is set, engaging in a range of experiences that enhance this learning.

Our Year 6 girls have a vastly different outdoor educational opportunity through their participation in a three-day bike riding experience called 'Sea to Summit'. The girls ride bikes along Linear Park from the coast to the foothills, stopping along the way to engage in a range of diverse and nature-focussed activities. Our Year 5 and Year 6 girls also attend non-Outdoor Education-focussed interstate educational tours to Ballarat and Canberra, respectively.

We are very proud of our Outdoor Education program and the learning opportunities it affords our girls right from the beginning of their Wilderness journey. Please look out for many wonderful photos in Life in the Wilderness as these events occur throughout the year, with our first below, showcasing our beautiful Year 2s' trip to Cleland Wildlife Park last week.

Year 2 Cleland Trip

In Week 3, the Year 2s went on their outdoor education excursion to Cleland. Here are some things that the Year 2s wanted to share about their visit to Cleland.

"We noticed that if you weren't careful the potoroos will try and steal our food."

"When feeding the kangaroos, we had to get down really low with lots of food in our hands so they could eat."

"We got up close with Laraby the koala and learned that koalas like to eat eucalyptus leaves. They like to sleep for 20 hours a day and eat for four hours."

"We used gardening gloves and tools to plant native seeds to help our environment. Some of the trees we planted were Golden Wattle and Sticky Hop Bush. We are very excited that they are going to be looked after at school and we can watch them grow."

"We were very lucky to pat Merlin the bearded dragon and learned that we

had to be very quiet so he doesn't get scared and puff up."


































SENIOR SCHOOL

Inaugural Year 12 Camp





Year 10 Work Experience

When? Wednesday 14 June to Friday 16 June

Why? Work Experience/Placement is the perfect opportunity for your daughter to:

- Gain real workplace experience
- Learn about people's careers and pathways
- Understand workplace and employer expectations
- See how what she learns at school is useful at work
- Find out if her dream job is what she thinks it will be
- Experience the kind of work she wants/does not want to do
- Develop confidence, self-understanding, maturity, and independence

How? She should start looking now.

• Some organisations that offer formal programs will require her to apply months in advance

- If there is a specific type of work she would like to try, it can take time to secure a suitable host employer
- Your daughter should contact businesses she is interested in and ask the owner or manager
- Encourage her to use her networks (who does she know who can help her?) and to
 ask all adults in her life like family members, friends' family members, teachers
 and those she knows through community organisations and clubs if they know of
 employers who may be willing to host her.

Apply:

- Many government departments, universities and local councils have programs, as do some commercial companies
- Your daughter should try looking online for formal work experience programs
- Encourage her to read her emails, as the Career Office advertises work experience opportunities which become available.

Encourage her to be persistent and resilient:

- She may need to ask a lot of employers before one says yes
- Most places would like to help students, but may not have the time or resources
- Remind her that it is not personal, so she should not be discouraged from persisting
- She should complete the work experience preparation document, provided by the
 career team at Wilderness. Then, if she has not been lucky enough to secure
 a placement, contact the career team to arrange to meet and work through options.

Your daughter must complete the official Work Placement paperwork on pathways.wilder ness.com.au (all five pages) and return it to the Career Office at Wilderness before **Friday** 12 May 2023.

UCAT 2023

If your daughter is in Year 12 and wants to apply for a medical, dental or clinical science degree, she may need to sit the UCAT. This is a two-hour computer test that helps universities to select applicants with the most appropriate abilities and professional behaviours required for new doctors and dentists to be successful in their clinical careers. It is used in collaboration with other admissions process such as interviews and academic qualifications. A range of preparation courses can be found here.

Sleek Geeks Science Competition

Sponsored by the University of Sydney, the Sleek Geeks Science Eureka Prize encourages students to communicate a scientific concept in a way that is accessible and entertaining to the public while painlessly increasing their science knowledge——or, as prize patrons Dr Karl and Adam Spencer like to say, "Learn something without even noticing". This year's theme is 'Green' and there are no rights or wrongs to selecting a topic. Your daughter is encouraged to be creative! First place is awarded \$3000 and the runner up will receive \$1500, divided equally between the winning student/s and school. Representatives from the finalist teams will win a trip to Sydney for the Australian Museum Eureka Prizes Award Ceremony. Finalists also receive vouchers from Abbey's Bookshop.

A USI is your daughter's individual education number for life, as it is an online record of her Australian training achievements. She needs a USI while she is at school is she:

- Does a VET subject
- Is going to do nationally recognised training, such as a First Aid certificate
- Is in Year 12 and plans to enrol at TAFE, university or a private college.

It is easy to apply for a USI, but she will need a form of identification such as her birth certificate or learner's permit. She can also check to see if she already has one or update her details here.

Please note: Year 9 students who attend REALISE apply for a USI. Students who commence at Wilderness School after Year 9 and who have not yet applied for a USI are advised to do so using the link above.
