FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Mid Term Energy Boost

It is hard to believe we are already halfway through Term 1 and, with restrictions lifting across the state, we have been able to safely manage some of the implications this has had for the School and finally offer some wonderful excursions.

Many of our girls kicked off the week with exciting and, most importantly, adventurous learning opportunities outside of the classroom. This included our Year 7 Camp Day Trips and Year 9 Inspire: Creative Product Design excursion to the JamFactory, both of which have encouraged our girls to step outside their comfort zones and extend their skills and abilities.

Last Friday, we were incredibly proud of Year 12 student Anesha Rahman and Year 11 student Allegra Kleinig who were among 24 students from public, independent and Catholic schools across South Australia taking part in Teen parliament, a new initiative by The Advertiser to ensure young people are heard. The girls' ability to contribute, explore current social and political issues and confidently develop their advocacy and take action is exceptional.

Throughout each girl's Wilderness journey and, more broadly, her life, she will think deeply about her interpersonal relationships. Not just the relationship she will have at school and in her community but also with the world – a world that is ever-changing.

Our girls have had to process the challenges and changes of a global pandemic and, unfortunately, are now facing the added uncertainty of conflict in Europe, which

dominates the current news cycle.

As parents, we naturally want to protect our children. Still, the reality is they may be exposed to information about the Ukraine conflict or the Queensland floods and may be curious, fearful or have questions.

To support you in having these conversations with your daughter, our School Psychologist, Ms Emma Thompson and School Counsellor, Mrs Julie Blackwell, have put together a support material which you can access here. It offers some tips on dealing with this issue and their contact details if you wish to receive further advice.

On Monday I had the opportunity to attend the Parents and Friends' Association (P&F) Annual General Meeting, where I heard President, Jen Guest, speak about the importance of feeling connected and supporting those within our community.

Off-campus Learning is Back

This week Middle School girls have left campus for the first time this year for some much-anticipated excursions.

They shifted to less familiar learning environments, with Year 7s involved in five days of Outdoor Education experiences, including surfing at Middleton, sailing at Seacliff, kayaking at Happy Valley, team building games at Mega Adventure, West Beach, and an ecology walk and snorkel at Hallet Cove.

The beach locations are rich in Indigenous history - dreaming stories explain the freshwater springs found from Warriparri, past Aldinga and onto Rapid Bay were created by the tears of Tjilbruke, mourning the death of his sister's son. These days have been a wonderful way for teachers and Form groups to build strong relationships with each other.

Both Year 9 Inspire: Creative Product Design classes visited the JamFactory to throw pots and become immersed in the world of a professional in the craft.

Comments made by the girls included, 'Imagine doing this every day or for a job', and 'I think I am going to take up pottery full time'.

These industry experiences are invaluable to visual arts students. To meet with, and learn from local, working artists, just a 10-minute bus ride from the School, is an experience that the girls will never forget.

Next week they return to the JamFactory to experience the glazing process and complete their creations.

I congratulate all girls who took part in this competition for being brave and sharing their ideas to make South Australia a great place to live.

Last weekend it was wonderful to be able to head down to West Lakes to watch our girls row in the SA State Rowing Championships. It was an incredibly successful weekend for the Wilderness Rowing Club, winning eight State Championships. I congratulate all girls and their coaches on their performances and look forward to the Head of the River on Saturday 19 March.

I was thrilled to learn this week of Devika Mukherjee's (Year 11) selection in the South Australian Schools' Debating Team, which will travel to Canberra in May for the National Championships. This is an impressive achievement that speaks to her well-developed communication and critical thinking skills as well as her broad general knowledge. We look forward to following Devika's progress over the next few months.

This week a number of Year 12 girls took part in the Prevent Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma in Youth (P.A.R.T.Y) Program. P.A.R.T.Y. aims to help teenagers understand risks, choices and consequences. Teenagers undergo a period of enormous change characterised by physiological, cognitive, psychological, financial and social changes. They are increasingly experiencing more freedom, but also more responsibility, particularly once they obtain their driver's licence.

While it is wonderful that we are slowly seeing a sense of normality returning to the School's programs, we can not take for granted the commitment by all members of the community to be COVID safe.

This needs to continue so we can enjoy the opportunities highlighted above to ensure all girls can gain the most out of their education at Wilderness.

CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

Drama in the Shadows

What do you do when a persistent global pandemic continues to 'switch off your stage lights'? You make drama in the shadows!

The delayed return to school and the state-wide ban on incursions meant several events planned for the first two weeks of Term had to be cancelled or rescheduled - or we had to do what we do best in the Arts: get creative!

Through the generosity and agility of the Slingsby Theatre Company, the Years 7 to 12 girls were treated to a screening of one of its highly acclaimed past productions, Emil and the Detectives. This ensured their learning program was not jeopardized, while Slingsby worked on filming their latest visiting work, This tree is a story (about everything, including you, as told by me), which they also made available to us.

Slingsby's shows are characterised by their innovative approach to storytelling - small casts play a multitude of characters and work with inventive techniques such as shadow play, miniaturised sets, projections, sound and audience participation in order to heighten the wonder and imagination of their stories.

Our students were captivated by both performances, which has made them think about how they can apply the range of staging techniques in their own theatre-making and challenging their understanding of what is possible as they develop as artists.

Andy Packer and Slingsby's commitment to working with and developing young artists and schools was demonstrated in their offer to run the planned workshop remotely, via Zoom. Years 10, 11 and 12 students collaborated in small companies to apply Slingsby's techniques under Andy's guidance.

Each group was armed with scissors, card, a white projection surface, a torch, and their imagination to create a short piece combining narration, miniatures and shadow play which told a coming-of-age or getting-of-wisdom story in Slingsby's style. Even Andy Packer was impressed with what they came up with in just 100 minutes - through experimentation, prototyping and testing ideas, and thinking about the impact they wanted to have on their audience. It was also a rare opportunity for the girls to make art with students in other year levels.

The Year 12 students will now develop a concept for a hypothetical Slingsby production as a major assessment, while the Year 11s will take their learning into the workroom to see how they can apply Slingsby techniques and approaches in the development of their company's maiden production which will be presented as part of their company launch later this term.

Year 10 students will present their original Commedia dell'Arte performance on the same night and are also inspired to use shadow and miniatures to help create the world and atmosphere of their play in a style which traditionally uses minimal props and almost no set.

We will look to have Dr Corinna di Niro return to us later this year when the Semester 2 Year 9 girls take their course in Commedia. The Year 9s and 10s were fortunate to have local actor, teacher and Commedia performer, Mr Andrew Crupi, work with them at short notice in developing the stories they will present this term.

Looking ahead, the Year 12s are deep in rehearsals for their major production of Caryl Churchill's Top Girls, which will be presented in Week 3 of Term 2. Written in 1982 and set in Britain during Margaret Thatcher's rise to power, the play examines the roles available to women in the modern society of the early 80's, and the roles women had to play to be successful in a 'man's world'. It also focuses the spotlight on the cost of ambition and the influence of Thatcherite politics on feminism. Churchill's plays are intentionally challenging in their structure, language, themes, and politics.

But this is a Year 12 class who can, and are ably, rising to the challenge. This will be a Year 12 production not to be missed.
