# Integral Industry Partnerships

Our School mission, to enable each girl to be the best she can be throughout her life, leads us to consider what it is that our girls may face in both their personal and professional lives once they leave Wilderness. What skills and capabilities will they need most, that we can help them to develop? What industries will be most relevant, that we can prepare them for? What preferred future can we enable them to cultivate?

I recently attended the Adelaide Economic Development Agency (AEDA) Business Summit to hear about topics that will impact on our girls' futures. Among these topics, the potential merger between the University of Adelaide and the University of South Australia, the growth of the technology sector and the potential for innovation in South Australia.

Also, with an eye on the future of our girls, our expert teachers enable purposeful learning by developing relationships with industry partners, building connections with professional fields.

Some of these relationships are included in our Design, Technology and Engineering subjects, as girls benefit from partnerships with the Australian Submarine Corporation, Saab Australia, Re Engineering Australia and JamFactory. This is boosted by enriching

excursions (including Fleet Space Technologies, Australian Space Discovery Centre, Lumination, Lot Fourteen and STEM Fast Track) where girls can learn at the source of exciting companies and innovation districts, and we hope to continue building on these relationships.

The Careers department is proactive in welcoming guest speakers to the School. Through events, workshops and opportunities, students connect with industry leaders——lincluding many old scholars who return to share their wisdom. Further opportunities for students in Years 8 – 12 to connect with industry exist through Rock IT, Try a Trade Program, Astrea and the Australian Defence Force. A future-focused approach allows students to develop career awareness and personal career management skills.

Our Musician and Artist in Residence were both on site last week to share their expertise with students, resulting in exciting creative output.

Musician and composer, Ross Irwin returned to Wilderness School to run workshops with our Music students throughout the week. The annual Jazz at The Gov concert was once again a highlight of the week, and the intimate venue enabled every ensemble performing to shine. In addition to two brilliant sets of his own, Ross also played alongside our students. The chance for our girls to share the stage with a professional musician is invaluable.

As our 2023 Artist in Residence, Leah Grant has been working with many year levels since Term 1. Last week, she ran a range of workshops that capitalised on her skills as a street artist and potter——including botanical drawings, collage and aerosols. Throughout the year, she has also worked alongside our Year 9 students on their REALISE experiences to install a mural at our Crawford campus, a project which will brighten the campus for years to come, and we look forward to sharing their progress.

As I listened to speakers at the AEDA Business Summit discuss the future of South Australia, I was encouraged by the knowledge that our teachers in all faculty areas are forward thinking and outward looking, ensuring that our girls have multiple opportunities for purposeful learning in their lessons, through expert workshops and also through volunteer opportunities.

It has certainly been a busy but fulfilling few weeks!

















## Year 4 Camp

To make damper, we mixed flour, butter, water and salt. After kneading it, we placed it in a cast iron pot over coals to cook. Eating it fresh tasted so good! We added fresh butter that we made by shaking jars filled with cream. During the Year 4 camp, girls displayed a growth mindset and adventurous learning, as most girls slept in tents for the first time. # Working With Children Check

From 1 July 2019, all persons aged 14 years and above are required to have a Working With Children Check (WWCC) in order to engage with children in sports coaching, community service work, work experience and a range of activities with our partner organisations (e.g. Sony Camp, Duke of Edinburgh Award program). The check has a currency of five years from the date of issue and will be free of charge in the capacity of a volunteer.

The online WWCC application takes approximately 5-10 minutes to complete and will require your daughter to undertake an identification check. A letter from the School will suffice for the total 100 points. Once processed, the DHS Screening Unit will send an outcome notification to the email address nominated in the application. A copy of this notification should be provided to our registrar via email once received, which will be uploaded to your daughter's student file.

In the term of her 14<sup>th</sup> birthday, your daughter will receive an email with instructions and will be provided with the identification letter. All students are encouraged to apply for their WWCC in the Middle School and reminders will be sent regularly.

# Fostering Student Support and Belonging

This week has reminded me of the importance of community and connection, in particular the crucial role they play in the development and wellbeing of all girls. In the formative period of their lives, adolescents are navigating numerous challenges, including academic pressure, social dynamics, personal growth and, unfortunately, the grief of losing important people in their lives.

There is no doubt that a supportive community fosters a sense of belonging and acceptance among students. When girls feel connected to their peers, teachers and their school, they are more likely to engage actively in the learning process, express themselves confidently and explore their interests. This positive environment encourages collaboration, empathy and the appreciation of diversity, nurturing essential social skills that they will carry forward into their adult lives.

Research shows that building connections with teachers and mentors is vital for academic growth. When girls feel comfortable seeking guidance and support from teachers and/or mentors, they are more likely to overcome academic challenges and hardship, develop critical thinking skills and cultivate a love for learning. At Wilderness, every day I see teachers who create a safe and inclusive classroom environment that positively impacts their students' self-esteem and motivation, fostering a sense of trust and encouragement.

Community involvement provides girls with opportunities for personal growth and

leadership development. Participation in extracurricular activities, clubs and community service projects allows the girls to explore their interests, develop new skills and make a positive impact in their local communities. These experiences enhance their self-confidence, resilience and sense of responsibility, preparing them for the demands of the future. This was clearly on show at Jazz at The Gov last week as the girls involved performed with our 2023 Musician in Residence, Mr Ross Irwin with confidence and style.

The tragic passing last weekend of old scholar Poppy Crozier (Class of 2021) also highlights the importance of our community coming together to acknowledge and process this terrible loss. Through empathy, understanding and compassion, our community is here to support those affected navigate the grieving process.

On a more positive note, **Devika Mukherjee** (Year 12) is congratulated on her success last week as the captain of the South Australian Debating team. The team won the National Schools Debating Competition for the first time since 1997. Devika has been selected as a member of the national team to compete at the World Schools Debating Championships later this year. This is an outstanding achievement and rewards her significant commitment to debating over many years.

Finally, a reminder that the Year 10 girls will have their university pathways and work experience week during Week 8 (Tuesday 13 June to Friday 16 June). 



In order to qualify as a registered psychologist, students need to complete a sequence of study, which includes completing an undergraduate degree followed by a Fourth Year Honours Program (plus additional study). #### Career: It's More Than Just a Job

Demographic research company McCrindle suggests Generations Zed (1995 – 2009) and Alpha (2010 – 2024) will have 18 jobs across six careers over their lifetimes. This prediction highlights the importance of young people taking an active role in their career development; the process of managing learning, work and leisure to advance in life.

Knowing how employers look for workers increases your daughter's chances of finding the right job. New data from Jobs and Skills Australia shows the three most common recruitment methods are posting online job ads, word-of-mouth and social media. What is interesting is that one in seven employers do not advertise at all! Instead, they use word-of-mouth or hire job seekers who directly approach them.

Where to look for jobs:

- 72% are advertised on company or job search websites
- 29% are promoted by word of mouth so your daughter should tell contacts, schoolteachers and neighbours when she is looking for work
- meeting and talking to employers makes a better impression than simply dropping off a resume
- make sure her social media profiles reflect her positively.

#### **Qantas**

# A Focus on Philosophy

At Wilderness, Philosophy is not merely an excavation of old or esoteric ideas and theories. Instead, the subject encourages students to critically engage with contemporary issues and apply pre-existing concepts in new and interesting ways. This approach allows students to navigate a world of ChatGPT, deep fakes and social media, which have forced us to re-evaluate our moral commitments.

In the Ethics unit of Year 9 Philosophy, students recently explored the popular and influential philosophical position known as 'longtermism'. This view has gained traction on Twitter and is endorsed by controversial figures such as Elon Musk and Nick Bostrom. Oxford philosopher and longtermist William MacAskill defines longtermism as "the view that positively influencing the long-term future is a key moral priority of our time" (MacAskill, 2022). Exploring longtermism has allowed students to join the discussion around this provocative position, investigating its merits and shortcomings and considering differing perspectives. This exploration also invites students to engage with pressing issues such as climate change, artificial intelligence (AI) safety and global pandemics, which are key concerns for longtermists.

At Wilderness, students can undertake Stage 1 and 2 Philosophy as part of their SACE in Years 10 and 11. Students develop critical thinking tools to evaluate and construct logical arguments. With these skills, they tackle topics in epistemology, ethics and metaphysics, engaging with philosophers' arguments and defending their positions on issues such as

our knowledge of the external world, the ethics of abortion and whether AI could one day be conscious. At the end of the year, students complete an Issues Study, selecting a philosophical issue they are interested in and exploring it through an in-depth investigation of philosophers' positions, while presenting their own stance.

Philosophy is an enduringly relevant subject. It cultivates socially and politically responsible citizens who can critically participate in ongoing discussions. Philosophy's generality enables the transfer of knowledge and skills to other subject areas, as seen in activities like writing argumentative essays in English or contemplating the moral status of historical events such as the bombings of Japan at the end of the Second World War. Additionally, Philosophy is not just practical; it can also provide insight into humanity's most difficult questions, including: What does it mean to be a good person? What makes my life meaningful? What should I hope for?
