Looking to the future, our SRC President Niya Singhal has recently presented at a conference on Reskilling Revolution: Preparing for the Future Workforce Landscape. As always, I continue to be inspired by the thoughtful contributions of our students, staff, and wider community.

Student Voice at the Forefront of South Australia's Economic Future

At a recent Committee for Economic Development of Australia (CEDA) event held at the Adelaide Convention Centre, Reskilling Revolution: Preparing for the Future Workforce Landscape, our SRC President, Niya Singhal, delivered the final address and summary presentation to an audience of government, education, and industry leaders. Representing not just Wilderness School but the voice of young South Australians, Niya spoke with insight, conviction, and a clear grasp of the challenges and opportunities facing our future workforce. She reflected on key themes raised by the panel, ranging from AI literacy and trade skills in regional SA to innovation, migration, and the brain drain and made a compelling case for including young people in decision making processes that shape their futures.

Her contributions highlight the importance of equipping young people with the skills,

mindset, and ethical grounding needed to navigate a rapidly evolving landscape. At Wilderness, this begins with our Artemis curriculum, which encourages students to think critically, adapt with confidence, and engage meaningfully with the world around them. Through programs like Artemis and Futures and Foresight, we are deliberately helping our girls to shape their futures.

It is both encouraging and energising to see one of our girls step so confidently into this space. Niya's voice is an example of our young people having agency in leading their futures.

Founder's Day

Founder's Day remains a deeply cherished tradition for us. This year's assembly brought together students, staff, and old scholars to learn about and honour the legacy of the Misses Brown —Wilderness School's pioneers whose vision and dedication continue to shape our school's identity. Following the assembly, it was wonderful to see old scholars reconnecting over a heartfelt lunch in Hender Hall, sharing memories and reflecting on their time at Wilderness. We are proud to carry forward their legacy and the values that make our school uniquely special.

National Reconciliation Week

During National Reconciliation Week, our Reconciliation Assembly was a meaningful event where we acknowledged the rich cultural heritage of Australia's First Nations people, held on Kaurna land. It was an opportunity to reflect on the importance of respect, understanding, and reconciliation within our community. Our library displays complemented the week's theme, Bridging Now to Next, featuring a wide selection of literature for all ages to help deepen our understanding of history and culture.

The past few weeks in the ELC have been rich with meaningful learning, celebration and connection. From exploring our school's proud heritage to engaging in National Reconciliation Week, the girls have embraced opportunities to develop a deeper understanding of themselves, their community and the world around them.

Both the Annie and Mamie House girls celebrated Founder's Day by learning about the remarkable Brown sisters, after whom our early learning spaces are named. These stories are powerful in helping the children connect past to present, and to begin to form a strong sense of identity as Mamie girls, 'big Annie girls' and, importantly, as Wildy girls.

In the Annie House, the girls also participated in a sustainability project with Miss Sarina, who is currently undertaking studies in early childhood leadership and advocacy. Together they have established a worm farm and a garden in the Parents and Friends Garden. This hands-on initiative has sparked ongoing conversations about care, responsibility and environmental stewardship. We look forward to continuing the watering together and, hopefully, enjoying the fruits of our hard work at lunchtime in the weeks to come. We are very thankful for Miss Sarina's dedication to this project, as it has made a significant contribution to the girls' learning.

Both houses acknowledged National Sorry Day and participated in learning experiences aligned with this year's Reconciliation Week theme, Now More Than Ever. In the Annie House, the girls made clay 'Care for Country' pots with their buddies and learnt the song "Heads, Shoulders, Knees and Toes" in Kaurna language. These activities have supported the children in building knowledge of First Nations culture through respectful, joyful and

developmentally appropriate learning.

In the Mamie House, the children listened to Somebody's Land by Adam Goodes and explored the meaning behind the Aboriginal flag. Each room created a collaborative artwork to serve as a meaningful and enduring reminder of our ongoing commitment to reconciliation. These works now sit proudly on display, anchoring a message that extends beyond one week and into the everyday rhythm of our learning community.

The Mamie girls also recently farewelled Miss Tommie as she begins her maternity leave. Her time with us was celebrated through the creation of a collaborative artwork, with each child contributing a unique petal to a shared piece that captures her lasting impact on our program. It is an incredibly impressive piece of art, and if you have not seen it, please visit the Mamie room where you will see it proudly displayed.

Finally, both Annie and Mamie girls were visited by author Louis Brennan, who shared his story Driver Camel's Rainy Day. This experience sparked a wave of storytelling, inspiring the girls to create and share narratives of their own.

As always, the ELC remains a place of thoughtful exploration, purposeful learning and deep connection, where each child's voice, creativity and sense of belonging are nurtured with intention and care.

da Vinci Decathlon and Incredible Art

da Vinci Decathlon

Congratulations to the Year 7 and 9 teams who competed in the da Vinci Decathlon. Following their win, the Year 9 team has been invited to represent the School and South Australia at the National Finals at the end of term. Below some members of the Year 9 team explain more about the Decathlon and their experiences at the State Finals.

The da Vinci Decathlon, is an opportunity to immerse students in 10 significant disciplines including English, Mathematics, Science, Art and Poetry, Legacy, Codebreaking, Engineering, Creative Producers, Ideation and Cartography. The state theme for 2025 was 'Light', where we explored a variety of topics like Shakespeare's utilisation of light in his works, light waves in a scientific perspective, how light can inspire artistic and innovative visions, ways light can be used and manipulated and how light has left a lasting legacy on our society.

We started the day with Art and Poetry, Ideation and Science where we were quizzed on the science behind Lasik surgery, lumens and designing futuristic glasses in Ideation. The Art and Poetry sector involved creating an artwork which evaluated the importance of art and poetry in our society, how it brings light to the world. Our team explored the themes of AI, human touch and history through our 3D piece which integrated an interconnected poem.

After a short recess, we returned to complete Maths, English, Cartography and Engineering. During this session, our team was called to complete Creative Producers; this year's topic centred around 'shedding light'. In Maths we calculated periods of Sine, measured shadows and determined distances travelled by lasers while our teammates engineered and created kaleidoscopes. In Cartography, we were presented with images of light maps and names of observatories and asked to locate them. English challenged out writing and comprehension skills by looking at the motif of light in Romeo and Julliet, analysing book covers and creating our own story around the theme of light.

Session 3 commenced after lunch, leaving two more disciples to be completed: Code Breaking and Legacy. We encountered a multitude of challenges ranging from deciphering Ceasar Shift and interpreting pictograms. We also looked at the legacy of da Vinci and the Renaissance, and the inventions and scientific discoveries of great scientists.

da Vinci Decathlon provided us an opportunity to converse with other schools, exercise our academic, teamwork and creative abilities. We placed first overall, earning us a chance to compete in Sydney on a national level under the theme of 'Turning Points'. We are incredibly excited to compete and represent Wildy at Knox Grammar at the end of this term.

Year 8 Art

Over the past two terms, our Year 8 Visual Arts students have been exploring two dynamic art styles through separate assessment tasks, developing both their technical skills and creative expression.

In **Term 1**, students created vibrant Pop Art-inspired paintings, focusing on bold colours, simplified forms, and high-contrast imagery. Drawing on the work of prominent Pop artist Andy Warhol, they explored how visual repetition, and everyday objects can be transformed into striking compositions. The learning intentions for this unit included understanding the key elements of Pop Art, experimenting with colour theory, and

developing composition and painting techniques.

In **Term 2**, students turned their attention to the Australian modernist Margaret Preston, whose bold lino prints and celebration of native flora offered rich inspiration for their own printmaking projects. Students designed and carved their own lino blocks, learning about relief printing techniques and the importance of line, pattern, and negative space in creating a successful print. They were encouraged to think critically about composition and symbolism while developing their technical skills in lino cutting and inking.

Throughout both projects, students have shown growing confidence in their artistic choices and an ability to respond to diverse styles in thoughtful and creative ways.

Curiosity, Resilience and Independent Thought

At the heart of education lies not just the acquisition of knowledge but the cultivation of curiosity, resilience and independent thought. As educators we are increasingly focussed on nurturing learners who are not only well-informed but also reflective and adaptable, skills essential in a rapidly evolving world. By encouraging critical thinking and fostering a genuine engagement with ideas we aim to support each girl in developing both confidence and a strong sense of purpose in their learning journey. This commitment is evident in the way our students engage with opportunities beyond the classroom. Niya Singhal, for example, recently spoke at the Committee for Economic Development of Australia's event Reskilling Revolution: Preparing for the Future Workforce Landscape, where she concluded the panel discussion by summarising key insights and offering her perspective as a young adult, an articulate contribution that underscored the value of student voice in shaping conversations about the future world of work. Similarly, Saanvi Khanna and Ada Qian demonstrated intellectual curiosity through their participation in the Australasian Neuroscience Society's Brain Bee Challenge last term and have since been invited to the SA State Final. These examples reflect the richness of learning that occurs when students are encouraged to engage thoughtfully with the world around them.

Study Skills and Exam Preparation

During Week 6, the Year 11 girls had the opportunity to engage with a range of sessions held by Elevate Education. The optional sessions were held during study periods, focussing on topics such as time management, revising for exams with confidence and study skills.

Year 11 mid-year exams will be held in Week 8. Subject teachers will be providing girls with information about the areas they need to revise. The Year 11 girls will be given a day of SWOT VAC on Friday 13 June. This day should be used to prepare for examinations.

Year 12 Update

As the temperature has started to drop, with Winter now here, the girls enjoyed some time spent together in the Common Room, with a surprise of hot chips delivered for lunch. The Year 12s also celebrated Halfway Day with popcorn, videos of old concerts and a Kahoot.

As we work towards the second half of the year, the longer assignments and external assessments will start to become a focus for the girls. It is essential that the girls plan their time well and work at these large pieces consistently.

The mid-year, Year 12 exams will be held in the first week of Term 3. The girls should be starting to consider their study program for the holidays to ensure they adequately prepare. These exams are an essential part of the curriculum and provide the girls and their teachers with valuable information for future growth and areas that require focus. The grades are also used to help formulate predicted grades for the end of year exams.

The pair participated in a student panel discussion on the use and impact of artificial intelligence in schools, presenting confidently on key issues such as:

- The responsibilities of schools in guiding students to use AI ethically
- How AI can help students overcome learning barriers
- The impact of AI on student creativity
- The bias that exists within AI technologies

With more than 100 educators in attendance from government, independent, and tertiary sectors, Shayla and Chloe spoke with clarity and conviction, offering an insightful student perspective on the role of AI in education.

Shayla and Chloe provided this summary:

Participating in the AI conference as students on a questioning panel, provided us with a very valuable insight into how AI is evolving in education contexts, and how it's likely to keep changing as we move beyond Year 12. One of the most useful parts of the experience was being able to speak directly to such a relevant audience, as we felt like our voices were actually being heard by the people shaping our education. It was also such a great opportunity to raise some of our concerns around how AI is used in learning, and what support students need to use it ethically and effectively. Being able to have those

conversations with teachers means we can help direct our own learning and make sure student perspectives are part of the conversation as AI continues to grow in schools.

Overall, it was an incredibly valuable experience, that we were extremely fortunate to take part in.

Shayla and Chloe's involvement not only highlighted the importance of student voice in shaping educational conversations but also reflected Wilderness School's ongoing commitment to empowering young people to lead and engage meaningfully with industry and emerging technologies.
