Perhaps the most telling confirmation that our history of 'trying things' continues today, is reflected in the Adventure Week organised by the Year 12 SRC. Inclusive of staff and girls from across the entire school, the week of lunch time obstacle courses, puzzles, games and treats enabled relationships to flourish.

EARLY LEARNING

Rising to the Challenge of National Reconciliation Week

Reconciliation Week posed an important challenge in 2022 and that was to 'Be Brave. Make Change'. This message calls upon everyone to tackle the unfinished business of reconciliation so that we can 'Make Change' for the benefit of all Australians. Our little people might only be three- and four-years-old, but they absolutely rose to this important challenge.

Together with their teachers, the ELC girls read and critically reflected upon picture books. In particular, the Mamie girls took a deep dive into the story of Somebody's Land—a powerful picture book written by Adam Goodes and Ellie Laing.

The Annie girls also built upon the same learning by creating a work of art with their hands, putting their hands up for caring for Country. They also shared a wealth of ideas about how we can all care for Country.

This learning was enriched by the work of **Anesha Rahmen** (Year 12) and her Poppa, Gary, when they visited the girls to share artefacts, photos and stories. Anesha shared from her perspective as an Indigenous person, about what Country means to her. We appreciated Anesha and Gary's time and would like to thank them for creating this

opportunity for our girls.

Taking this learning further, the Annie girls considered the relationship between Indigenous people and their land, acknowledging that it is one of reciprocity and respect. The girls learned that something found on the land must be returned to its original place. So, the girls created beautiful clay bowls that they can now use to collect items from the land, for careful observation and appreciation, before returning them to the land. The class reflection on the text Miimi Marraal, Mother Earth by Melissa Greenwood, which took the girls' learning to another level.

The Mamie girls also extended their learning into clay work by creating echidnas. Not only was this an incredibly enjoyable activity, but it was influenced by Anesha's reflection on Dreamtime stories and the reference in Somebody's Land to telling stories. The Echidna and the Shade Tree, by Mona Green and Pamela Lofts, was the book that inspired the clay work.

As with all special weeks in the calendar, Reconciliation Week highlights learning and provokes thinking through its calls to action, but it certainly does not stop at the conclusion of the week. This work will continue in the hearts and minds of all our girls and teachers.

Junior Schoolers Get Out and About

The Year 3 students enjoyed a three-day Outdoor Education adventure during Week 5. On Wednesday, the girls ventured to Belair National Park, where they worked collaboratively to build humpies——Itemporary shelters traditionally built by Indigenous people. They also demonstrated their creativity by using various plants and berries to create a symmetrical, naturally-coloured print on fabric. Each girl collected plants and berries and used a mallet to transfer the colour to their fabric. They also had the opportunity to explore the fantastic adventure playground at Belair.

Thursday was spent at the Adelaide Botanic Gardens, where we were fortunate enough to be visited by Trent, a proud Noongar man from Western Australia. Trent took the girls on a tour of the gardens, sharing his knowledge about the traditional uses of trees and plants and relating seasonal movements to the surroundings. The girls were also shown Trent's collection of traditional artefacts and learned about the roles of men and women. Trent treated us to music played from his didgeridoo, a Dreaming Story and even demonstrated traditional fire-making methods by creating a small ember. The girls practised mindfulness by journaling in their 'magic spots' and soaking in their natural surroundings.

The experience finished back at school on Friday with boomerang painting and clay fish cooking. Collaboratively, the girls wrapped their ocean trout fish in thick clay before placing them in the campfire to cook. The girls showed their adventurous spirit by tasting the fish fresh from the coals. They adapted to the wintry weather by concluding with

independent journaling and learning some words in the Kaurna language.

A big thank you to Ms Mitchell and the Outdoor Education department for a fun, adventurous and stimulating week. The Year 3 students all had a fabulous time!






























SENIOR SCHOOL

Crucial Creativity

While change impacts every era, it is the speed of the change, the multitude of the trends and the global nature of them that are so transformative today. To this extent, it is not so much that we are tracking towards the future, but rather, the future is coming at us, and not only at an increased velocity, but often from an unknown direction.

Some may consider this daunting, yet change provides opportunity and something that the girls need to understand is a given as they move through their schooling and into their professional lives. What we do know is that there is a range of capabilities and skills that will set girls up to cope with the evolving nature of the workplace and to be able to make a difference. One of the key skills that all futurists agree on is 'creativity'.

The late Sir Ken Robinson defined creativity as "the process of having original ideas that have value". Robinson highlighted that creativity can be taught——Inot through direct instruction, but by giving students opportunities, inspiration, encouragement and mentoring. Creativity is different from imagination, which is the ability to bring to mind things that aren't present to your senses.

With this in mind, over the past two weeks, we have seen creativity in action with our annual Artist and Musician in Residence programs.

Last week, we welcomed Adelaide-based painter, Hamish Fleming. Hamish works in the genre of expressive realism, combining more contemporary aspects with the traditional painting forms of still life, landscape and portraiture.

On Monday, we welcomed Adam Page to work alongside and inspire our musicians. Adam is best known for his multi-instrumental looping show that he has presented around the world since 2006. At Assembly, Adam played with Big Band 1 and then demonstrated his exceptional looping skills which had the girls in awe of his creative skills. The annual Jazz at The Gov concert was again a highlight of the music calendar which was enjoyed by all in attendance.

It is opportunities like these that reinforce the importance of developing capabilities and skills that the girls will require for the future. Girls must be able to think creatively, think like an innovator and think like an entrepreneur if they are going to secure employment and tackle the complex problems facing the world.

Geographers Return to the Outdoors

Friday 27 May saw the Stage 1 geographers brave the 14°C maximum to undertake their first fieldwork in two years. COVID-19 restrictions have been particularly challenging for our geographers at Wilderness, with fieldwork skill development and application occurring solely in their immediate local environments; on campus, around homes and at the Parklands. This trip, investigating the preparedness of the Adelaide Hills for fire season and the effectiveness of prescribed burns in the Mt Lofty Region, thankfully went ahead.

"The field trip provided us with insight into the preparedness and prevention strategies of bushfires in the Adelaide Hills. Due to COVID-19, we haven't been able to venture outside of School grounds, so being able to go out and about, undertaking hands-on fieldwork was a very valuable experience for us."

Students first travelled to Mt Lofty Summit to successfully observe and hypothesise the impact of north facing slopes and steep aspect, followed by the application of various fieldwork skills including the construction of cross sections, quadrat analysis and fuel assessment ratings to four sites within the Cleland Conservation Park. The data collected will inform the students' fieldwork requirement for Stage 1 Geography related to local contemporary issues.



IGSSA Swimming Carnival

Last week, our Wilderness swimmers had another outstanding meet at the IGSSA Swimming Carnival on Tuesday 31 May. Wilderness performed incredibly well, placing in 52 of the 57 events and finishing first in 29. These results secured the 13 Years, 16 Years and Open Age pennants, Intercol Swimming Trophy and the IGSSA Shield. Previously, Wilderness won the Shield in 1996 and 2010, and the School has taken out all three major swimming titles in 2022 for the first time ever!

Creativity Takes Up Residence at Wilderness

Jazz at The Gov with our Musician in Residence: Adam Page

This week we have been blessed to have local musician Adam Page join us at Wilderness. Adam has worked with our music students across all realms of Music, including composition, improvisation and solo and ensemble performance.

The week began with the annual Music Assembly, in which Adam blew the students away with his infectious energy, and the highlight was certainly when he selected Year 11 student **Jess Craig**'s name and created a looping spectacular just using the words of her name.

On Wednesday evening, we once again were given the opportunity to perform at The Governor Hindmarsh for our annual 'Jazz At The Gov' concert, and it was a resounding success. Adam featured with all of the ensembles on the night, with highlight performances from the Sax Quartet and their insanely fast version of The Brecker Brothers 'Some Skunk Funk' and the Jazz Choir's inspired version of Bruno Mars' 'Uptown Funk'—which in true 'tropeano-style' featured as many songs as possible in the space of five minutes! Complete with Adam looping all the sounds he could muster, it brought the house to its feet. Ending the night was Big Band 1 with a huge set of music and a massive tenor sax solo from our musical guest.

The enormity of what these students achieved in the lead up to this event, and during the course of this week, is nothing short of inspirational, displaying the highest level of resilience from our young musicians. Battling illness, never-ending absenteeism during rehearsals and an influenza outbreak affecting us all school-wide, the sheer fact these girls were on the stage was a miracle. Artist in Residence

This week, the Art Department launched its annual Artist in Residence Program, with Art students engaging in stimulating discussions and activities planned by their teachers in conjunction with Hamish Fleming. The Adelaide-based painter worked directly with Years 2 and 6-11 Art students this week.

Hamish introduced himself and his work to Year 2 Art students through an artist talk, which focused on the history of still life and its importance.

Year 6 Art students were introduced to his work through a discussion of realism in painting, specifically the importance of the relationship between light and colour as the foundation of realism in Hamish's work.

He focused on how his work blends classical and contemporary concepts, leading Year 7 students through an analysis of a still life from the Dutch Golden Age, before students undertook their own analysis of Hamish's artwork in the Art Centre gallery.

Similarly, Year 8 Art students analysed one of Hamish's still life paintings following a discussion about still life and its lasting relevance.

The Year 9s also explored the elements in Hamish's work that contribute to developing realism in painting, before analysing two works of art relevant to their current painting studies.

With our Year 10 students, Hamish shared his educational background and the beginning of his career in the creative industries. He led students in a painting workshop, where they painted a self-portrait using the limited Zorn colour palette. Similarly, Hamish shared his current work in progress with Year 11 students, engaging them in a discussion and sharing aspects of the creative process with students as they work through their own this semester.

Included in the residency program is an exhibition of the artist's body of work, displayed in our Art Centre Gallery. The works are used as a teaching resource for students, enriching their Art learning and fostering an appreciation for the contemporary arts practice.

This exhibition will remain in the Gallery for viewing until **Friday 17 June**. We are looking forward to Hamish returning next semester to conclude the program in Week 7 of Term 3.

Key Dates: Year 12 Graduates 2022

The main offer round will occur in January 2023 — no university offers will be made before then (apart from to international students).
