FROM THE PRINCIPAL

More than a word. Reconciliation takes action.

On Thursday 3 June, our Citizenship Committee recognised National Reconciliation Week with a whole school assembly. The occasion provided an opportunity for our girls to acknowledge the importance and connection that aboriginal people have with the land and to further understand their history.

I would like to acknowledge and thank Gabrielle Lawrie-Wilson, Myarn Alden, Zara Hart and Anesha Rahman, who willingly revealed their families' history and bravely shared what reconciliation means to them and why it is important.

Anesha gave the following speech:

Burany garlanda – good morning

Yaa nhundu yan.guwa? - how you going?

Nganangu ini Anesha – my name is Anesha

Ngadhu yun.gu nhundu nganagu - I give you my

Burany guwanda wiru - best wishes and spirits

Ngalimiming gami bibi, mama, yargula barna buranymarda. - Our grandmothers, mothers and fathers sacred country is good.

Good morning, how you going? My name is Anesha. I give you my best wishes and spirits. Our grandmothers, mothers and fathers sacred country is good.

The language I am speaking to you is Badimia, as I am from the Aboriginal group called Badimia which is in the Yamaji region of Western Australia. There are many different Indigenous groups with different stories, languages and situates.

To me, reconciliation means connecting with my culture on a deeper level. I am learning to share and be proud of my culture in ways that my family were not able to do. My grandpa grew up in a time when identifying as being Aboriginal was completely unaccepted due to severe racism. His mother was a part of the Stolen Generations and lived in fear of her children being removed from her and institutionalised. Due to this, my poppa couldn't express his culture or even be remotely involved in speaking the Badimia language. This is why learning the language is so important to my connection to culture, as it helps me to feel closer to my ancestors, and actively embrace my culture that was so disapproved of in the past.

In particular the 2021 theme of Reconciliation Week is more than a word. To me, this means not just appreciating Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and history, but also making impactful action towards reconciliation. Using words to spread awareness is not enough without turning those words into actions and influencing change.

This theme also means building a relationship between the non-

Indigenous and Indigenous communities to generate a deeper cultural understanding which can lead to more action. Connecting to culture is vital for me because it is a part of my identity. I connect with my culture through learning the Badimia language from my grandpa and mother, and reconnecting with country in Western Australia.

I also use Reconciliation Week to take the time to reflect on the strength and guidance my ancestors have given me. In addition, it is important for me to connect with other Indigenous students and listen to their journeys.

Each year I come into Reconciliation Week with a new perspective, more knowledge and cultural understanding which I aim to further develop as my cultural journey progresses.

We are incredibly proud of our girls' purist in recognising the need to take action and ensuring each of their diverse cultures is respected and celebrated.









EARLY LEARNING

National Reconciliation Week

Reconciliation is a journey for all Australians, and it can start with small steps.' (ABC Kids Early Education)

In National Reconciliation Week this year, the teaching and learning in our ELC was informed and inspired by the well-researched Play School National Reconciliation Week Special: Walking Together. This episode supported the development of the girls' early understandings about our shared histories and the role we all play in building relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures and futures.

After watching and learning from the episode Walking Together, the Mamie girls created their own artwork – a visible walk showing footprints taken together in unity. To construct their special piece, the girls were invited to paint their feet and walk along together, demonstrating that even though we are different, we can all walk together. This artwork has been displayed on the wall in the Mamie House and is reflected upon as a reminder of the importance of establishing and maintaining respectful relationships with each other. Respectful Relationships, a Wilderness School value, was certainly held at the heart of this learning.

In the Annie House, the girls connected with this learning in another way, creating hands to represent the idea of raising our hands for reconciliation. This learning was deepened further when the question, 'How can we be responsible citizens and care for Country?'

was posed. In response to this, the girls' answers were scribed onto the back of the hands they had created and placed in the garden. As we learnt in Walking Together, Country is the place that Aboriginal people connect to and not only refers to the land but includes all living things. It was clear in this learning that another special Wilderness value, Responsible Citizenship, was a key component.

Throughout the rest of the week, this learning included the girls watching an Acknowledgement of Country with Play School and reflecting on the special items found on the land we walk upon. In the Annie House, the girls also read a Dreamtime story, How the Birds Got Their Colours, which supported their learning about the concept of a Dreamtime story and its message.

To conclude National Reconciliation Week, our smallest Wildy girls have taken their very own small steps as a part of our journey, a journey that commenced before Thursday 27 May and will continue after Thursday 3 June. It is a journey that remains true to our Wilderness School values and one that seeks to build a community that values all cultures, including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, their histories, cultures and futures.

Celebrating Boarding Week

Sunday 16 May to Saturday 22 May (Week 5), marked the Australian Boarding Schools Association (ABSA) National Boarding Week.

The week is aimed at raising awareness about the many benefits of boarding schools and celebrating the important part our boarding community plays in the fabric of the School and wider community.

Wilderness School joins ABSA in the celebration of the almost 200 non-government boarding schools that provide world-class educational opportunities for any student, regardless of where they call home.

For some 128 years, boarding has been at the heart of the Wilderness School experience. The Brown Family moved to our current site in 1893, and within three months, they had their first boarder, Amy Baily, from Two Wells. In the early days, the boarders lived with the Brown sisters in the upper level of Browns House. Over the years, many girls have enjoyed a wonderful opportunity to live and learn on campus, develop independence, resilience, and form lifelong friendships while living together in a diverse and inclusive community.

Our boarding community is large enough to foster personal growth yet small enough to notice and cater for diverse individual difference and interests. The nuances of boarding life do present challenges, and at times the girls struggle with the physical distance from family. Despite this, at the core, they are proud to be a Wilderness boarder, and there is an undeniable sense of sisterhood generated from the camaraderie of their shared experiences. This is never more evidently expressed than on Sports Day and Swimming Carnival, when the Boarders vs Day Girls events spark enthusiastic and competitive rivalry.

While boarding provides many opportunities, it also demands the girls to be agile, optimistic, develop empathy, take responsibility, show initiative and compromise.

Along with celebrating our amazing boarding students, National Boarding Week provides a great opportunity for our boarders to say thank you to the vast network of staff who provide rich learning experiences and pastoral support that ensure a positive experience during their boarding journey. We rely upon so many of our teachers, coaches etc, even our maintenance team who, almost daily, keep the lights on and the air conditioners serviced.

We also recognise and thank the day school families who so generously open their homes for Tuesdays for Tea, hosting girls over the weekends, providing a home-cooked meal, transportation and providing that often missed sense of home. And finally, to our boarding staff, who provide the foundations of support to create positive experiences, quidance and a sense of belonging in their home away from home.

Day Girls for Dinner

As a way to celebrate National Boarding Week, each boarder invited a day friend to dinner.

The café was a buzz every night last week as each of the year levels hosted their friends for dinner. The day girls enjoyed the experience of sharing a meal with so many girls and getting an insight into how dinner service happens in a boarding environment.

Each year level chose the menu for the night they were hosting. The visiting day girls enjoyed the experience and getting a better understanding of life of the boarders after 3.30pm. It was gratifying to see the girls introducing themselves and thanking the staff and their friends for the invitation.

Charlotte Linke and Victoria Lane had some planned activities to add to the interaction and engagement each night, which added to the light-hearted banter between the girls.

Congratulations Myarn

Mrayn Alden recently designed the MetroStars playing kit for the SAASTA Aboriginal Football Academy. The SAASTA Aboriginal Football Academy is a sports-based education program for Aboriginal Students run in partnership with the North Eastern MetroStars Soccer Club. Myarn explains the design and what it means to her.

My name is Myarn Alden, my skin name is Numbajin. I am a proud Kija and Juru woman from the Kimberley.

Traditionally where I'm from, our art uses dot painting to tell stories. The story behind my design is about the first two teams, MetroStars and Croydon, coming together for the Indigenous Round.

On the front, the red stream represents the MetroStars colour but also symbolises the red dirt on my country. The yellow outline of the red stream represents the Torrens River that makes its way to the MetroStars home ground. The circles convey the two teams, MetroStars and Croydon. I learnt this technique from my Kumputu (Great grandmother on my maternal side). She is a Ngarti woman from Halls Creek.

Growing up, I gained her knowledge about our beautiful art and how to express a story through our dot painting. The Kangaroo footprints signify the two teams walking together. The boomerang is a part of the South

Australian Aboriginal Academy (SAASTA) logo.

SAASTA partners with MetroStars to run the Aboriginal Football Academy (AFA). The AFA gives Aboriginal students from around the country the opportunity to come together to learn and play football together. The white dots on the back are stars for MetroStars. The stars also remind me of my country and being with family in my community.

Bingo Night with Rostrevor College

The senior girls revealed their competitive side on Friday night with a bingo match between the Year 11 and 12 boys from Rostrevor College. Lots of prizes were won, and the night ended with a big screen show of the AFL, which was appreciated by all. A big thank you to Safara Moyse and Jessica Schutlz for organising the run of the night, and I am sure another games night is on the horizon soon.

Reconciliation Breakfast and Assembly

Myarn Alden and Zara Hart were not only up at the crack of dawn to attend the Reconciliation Breakfast at the Adelaide Convention Centre but also did a brilliant job presenting at our own whole school Reconciliation Assembly last Thursday. Having the courage to speak in front of one's peers can be a daunting thought. I was very proud of them for the courage shown as Myarn offered the Acknowledge to Country, and Zara shared her family's personal story and why Reconciliation is such an important ideal for First Nation peoples.

































SPORT

Junior School Sport in Focus

Junior School Sport at Wilderness enables girls to participate in a variety of developmentally appropriate sports. Our focus is on participation and inclusion, regardless of ability.

Participation in sports from an early age allows girls to have fun while experiencing the important social aspects of being part of a team. For our girls who are building their confidence and competence, there is a 'Training Only' option available to allow them to work toward playing in games against other schools.

Our Junior School Sports Program offers opportunities to senior girls to take up leadership activities such as umpiring and coaching. It is a fantastic opportunity to encourage positive interaction between our junior and senior girls in an enjoyable environment.

For girls who are seeking a more competitive pathway, there are substantial opportunities to trial and compete for positions in district teams for the South Australian Primary Schools Amateur Sports Association (SAPSASA). SAPSASA offers girls the opportunity to compete in representative teams for the North Adelaide District and state representation. Many of our girls are actively involved in SAPSASA sports. Unfortunately, due to COVID restrictions, there will not be interstate competitions this year, but there are still statewide events on offer. Currently, we have girls nominating for selection in SAPSASA hockey and soccer, of which we hope to share their successes with the

community soon.

Junior School Sport offerings change each term allowing girls to participate in multiple sports.

Year 1 and 2

This term, our Year 1 and 2 girls have continued to have their lunchtime multi-sports which are focused on developing confidence and movement competence in a wide range of games and activities. These sessions are run in the Gym and coached by our Senior School girls.

For Term 2, we were also able to offer Auskick to our Year 1 and 2 students after school on Wednesday. The AFL facilitates Auskick through volunteers to introduce players to Australian Rules Football.

Year 3 and 4

Our Year 3 and 4 girls have had the opportunity to play minkey, a modified version of hockey playing six a side. Our girls have fielded two teams under the watchful eye of the Hockey Head Coach, Mr Travis Henderson and a number of experienced Senior School players and coaches.

Girls have also had the opportunity to be involved in 'Training Only Lacrosse', which has been a popular choice for many students learning the sport's fundamental skills. The Junior School Lacrosse Program has been run by three of our Wildy Graduates from 2020 who are still involved in club lacrosse.

Year 5 and 6

Our Year 5 and 6 girls have been able to play netball and hockey. Both sport opportunities have progressed from the modified Year 3 and 4 offerings of nettaball and minkey, respectively. The girls have been fortunate to be under the guidance of experienced senior girls and coaches of our Senior School sports.

Indigenous Round Footy

Last Friday evening, all grades of our AFL teams sported the colours of the Indigenous flag in support of the Indigenous Round. This is a celebrated Round of AFL, highlighting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander contributions to the great game of Australian Football that even included a Smoke Ceremony at Westminster. Myarn Alden tossed the coin before the Senior A game against Concordia, which we won 49-2. Well done, girls!

State Cross Country Championships

Wilderness had six girls competing in the SAPSASA North Adelaide District Team and 19

girls competing for Wilderness in the Years 8-12 Championship event.

Caitlin Hardin (Year 7) placed second in the 12 Years Event individually.

Caitlin Hardin (Year 7), India Goodall (Year 6) and Margot Tembel (Year 6) were all part of the North Adelaide District Team who won the 12 Years Girls Age Championships for the SAPSASA North Adelaide District.

Madeleine Forde (Year 8), Emily Powers (Year 8), Gia Rinaldi (Year 8) and Bella Browning (Year 8) were part of the Wilderness 13 Years Girls Team who placed third in the 13 Years Girls Age Championships.

Visual Art

Artist in Residence

Rosina Possingham's generous approach to sharing her ideas and expertise has resulted in a very productive and engaging experience for art students this term.

Her proficiency in facilitating collaborative art-making opportunities has resulted in the creation of a variety of diverse artworks and rich learning for students from Reception to Year 12.

Among the many works created, our Year 7 and 8 Art students collaborated to create an aerial map of Wilderness School in its surroundings. They used Adobe Fresco, iPads and Apple Pencils to carefully match colours and shapes to re-represent the School using data from Google Maps and drone shots. Each section has been reassembled together to create one visually interesting and abstracted artwork.

Additionally, Year 3 Art classes experienced creating Cyanotypes, a photographic process invented in 1842. Paper is coated with a light-sensitive solution that is created using a mixture of two chemicals. It is prepared and dried in the dark.

A print is created by placing a negative (to produce a photograph) or objects (to make a photogram) in contact with the paper, sandwiched behind a piece of glass and exposed to UV light. By gently washing the chemicals from the paper, the resultant print can be seen.

Using fresh cuttings from the School gardens and photographic imagery captured by Rosina, students developed many beautiful cyan-blue prints. The photographic imagery included pressed flowers and handwriting captured by Rosina from the notebooks of one of our founding sisters, Miss Mamie Brown.

Rosina digitally collaged the individual prints to create a cohesive artwork that visually captures our school from past to present through its plant life.

We continue to celebrate Rosina's contribution to our arts learning through an exhibition of the work created as part of her residency. The work can be viewed in the Art Centre Gallery and Junior School Art Room until the end of this term.


