EARLY LEARNING

Learning at Home

During the Term 3 holidays and over the professional learning days, the Early Learning Centre team carefully and intentionally prepared a stimulating learning environment based on girls' interests in Term 2.

Considerable time was also invested in collaborating to embed new learning from the 2021 Reggio Emilia Research Symposium, Landscapes of Relationships: Inspiration, exchange, and dialogue for the future of childhood, attended virtually by the teachers in the holidays. This generated thought-provoking questions and we planned next steps for our ongoing learning projects. Then the lockdown was announced!

Planning very quickly transformed in response to the impending lockdown and learning was launched online. Certainly, our physical environment at school was no longer required, but the learning projects girls were engaging in at the conclusion of Term 2 were simply taken online. Seesaw, our digital platform usually used to share photos and videos of daily learning at school, was flipped, and in reverse, parents used the platform to share photos and videos with us.

Quite fortunately, for the holidays, the Mamie girls had taken home Jonquil bulbs as a part of our Butterfly Garden holiday project, linked to previous lifecycle learning and kindly donated by one of our Mamie families. The girls were required to care for their bulbs and as scientists, determine the optimal growing environment and observe the changes over time. The plan was then to return the bulbs at the start of Term 3 so they could be planted in our School garden. This of course could not occur, so the girls continued to observe their bulbs at home and planted them in their own gardens, sharing their learning through Seesaw with their educators. This created a strong link between home and school.

Furthermore, the lockdown weather certainly provided our Annie girls with an excellent provocation for their continued 'More than Just Water' project. The girls observed and documented the weather from home and one of our Annie girls cleverly reused a water bottle to create a rain gauge. At school, the girls had identified where water is used, so this week the girls identified and photographed where water helps us at home.

Our specialist teachers in music, library and physical education also connected with the girls over the four days of remote learning. These experiences had the girls singing, dancing, drawing, listening and responding to stories, and creating challenging obstacle courses.

We would like to say a very big thank you to our parents for connecting to the learning that was provided, and an equally big thank you to the whole Early Learning Centre team for leading and supporting the girls through this period.

Learning certainly might not have been how we planned it, but it still occurred and just like on any normal ELC day, it was different for everyone yet personally meaningful for all – parents included!



















JUNIOR SCHOOL

Opportunity to Learn

What an unusual welcome we experienced at the beginning of Semester 2. We certainly didn't expect to see our little girls' smiling faces on our computer screens rather than in our classrooms!

Having the opportunity to visit many online learning lessons across our five days of lockdown was truly rewarding as Head of the Junior School. In particular seeing the calm, warm and focussed learning environments that our teachers were able to provide for their girls remotely, in addition to how well-equipped even our smallest girls have become at adapting to this different mode of coming together.

With young children, so much of their learning at school is in the 'hidden curriculum'. This involves understanding and applying the behaviours of being a learner in a collective environment, learning group norms and operating and cooperating within them. It is also about navigating the wealth of new and nuanced interactions and relationships that come with beginning school. The onset of online learning provided yet another set of parameters for our girls to understand and in effect, they had to quickly 'learn how to learn' in this environment. To say I am proud of the way they engaged, contributed, asked questions and displayed respect for both their teachers and friends is an understatement.

Thank you also to you, their parents and families for your support and positivity throughout this period. We know the impact of managing online learning with your own

work and home commitments can be enormously challenging. You truly enacted this beautifully. Thank you also to so many of you who provided such kind feedback to your daughters' teachers during this time; it was both heartening and very much appreciated.

Our staff also demonstrated this ability to pivot and be flexible on the Tuesday that the lockdown was announced. As a staff group, we were deeply engaged in professional development when we learnt that the girls would begin the term in online learning mode. In a matter of hours, our staff had banded together to ensure that devices and learning packs were available for collection before moving into planning for the coming days. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the Junior School teaching and support staff for their unfailing commitment to our girls, for their ability to be creative and positive under pressure and for the way that they drew together and supported one another to ensure that a quality and connected experience was available to each girl.

We now look towards a term of adjusting to learning under the conditions of the necessary restrictions. I am delighted to share with you in this edition of Life in the Wilderness some of our experiences of online learning in Reception. Always interesting, sometimes challenging and filled with unexpectedly funny and beautiful moments, we chose to think of it as an opportunity to learn differently, to consider what is truly important and to find new and creative ways of maintaining our sense of belonging and connection to our Wilderness community.

Receptions learning online

The Reception Team had already prepared our learning environments for the new semester and we eagerly awaited the return of our girls to fill the classrooms with all their lovely energy and enthusiasm when the call to online learning came. Remote learning required creativity on the part of educators, flexibility on the part of our young students, and a lot of support and patience from our parents!

Webex became the way we could stay connected, enabling us to chat in small groups in both the morning and early afternoon. Our wonderful Co-educators, Mrs Emma Franzon and Mrs Justine Anderson, utilised the screen-sharing aspect of Webex to have one-toone reading sessions with each student.

Keen not to have our little learners in front of screens too much, we used Seesaw to uploaded a range of activities. We gave them challenges such as scavenger hunts to find things beginning with each letter of the alphabet, creations inspired by the new digraph 'something blue for ue' and using play dough to form the letters of new words. It was wonderful to see our girls embrace this style of learning as they uploaded their hard work for us to see and comment on.

A huge thank you to all our parents for the amazing support they provided their girls with during this challenging time!












































MIDDLE SCHOOL

SENIOR SCHOOL

Resilience of our Senior Girls

While this was not the start to Term 3 that we predicted, I am very proud of how the girls and staff adapted to online learning for the first week of school.

I was grateful for the way our Year 12 girls moved smoothly on to online exams in the middle of their mid-year exam block and the fact that Term 3 is underway and the learning of all girls has continued seamlessly.

It was fantastic to see the girls back at school on Wednesday and hopefully, we will be able to remain at school for the rest of the term thanks to the willingness of South Australians to get tested and remain in lockdown. While there will need to be some modifications to several programs and school activities, this is a small price to pay to have the girls back at school.

Subject Selection 2022

Over the next month, Year 10 and 11 girls will begin subject selection for 2022. The girls will be provided with a range of information from Heads of School, the SACE Coordinator, Heads of Faculty, and careers advisors to support them in their decision making.

Last week I had the opportunity to read an informative article written by Professor Nan Bahr from Southern Cross University about factors to consider when choosing subjects for Senior School. While this can be a daunting time, given that the girls are considering future career paths, these decisions need to be kept in perspective. I encourage you to consider the following points when discussing subjects for 2022 with your daughter.

Senior subjects will significantly influence your career pathway

Rapid advancements in technology will mean the skills our girls need for their future careers are vastly different from the skills required today. Industry advice bodies such as the National Skills Commission, recommend that students choose subjects that suit their interest and skill set, rather than prepare for a specific future career.

A 15-year-old today is likely to have 17 different employers in their lifetime and make five major changes in their career pathways. Hence, the senior subjects they take now may have little impact on future job opportunities.

Employers are demanding communication skills when hiring and that transferable skills, such as teamwork, communication, problem-solving, innovation and emotional judgement, are widely acknowledged as important in driving business success. Subjects like Music, Drama and Physical Education teach these skills that employers value the most.

As a part of our Year 11 Artemis program, girls are asked to consider the skills they will need in 2035 to be successful. We need our girls to be future focused and not just think about the current employment environment and what we as parents have experienced. The world is different now!

You have to do the D'academic' subjects to get a good ATAR

Students can find subjects challenging if they lack interest or ability. This means girls are unlikely to do well if they are unhappy and unmotivated. If a girl only values a subject for what it might get her, like a high ATAR, she is unlikely to be as successful as she could be studying something she enjoys.

Year 12 will be demanding and stressful

Year 12 can be demanding and stressful, but it doesn't have to be. The most common source of distress comes from anxiety, specifically test anxiety, and the pressures that come from selecting subjects for reasons not driven by interest and ability. Girls with a range of subject types and co-curricular activities will have variety in their day and week. They are more likely to enjoy their Year 12. Balance is important.

An ATAR score is the only way to get into a course at university

While the ATAR is an important part of our girls' educational journey, it must be remembered that there are several pathways to universityD—Dan ATAR is only one of them.

For example, engineering normally requires an ATAR in the mid 80s. However, there are

other pathways such as a VET certificate, diploma or TAFE course to get into engineering. There are several alternative pathways described by most institutions on their websites that can be used as entry to university.

Taking a VET subject in Senior School will negatively impact your ATAR

Taking a VET subject during Senior School is likely to provide a balanced education, which may improve a girl's chance for a high ATAR as well as provide the opportunity to:

- Gain a nationally recognised qualification before leaving school, which can be useful for gaining a part-time job during university studies
- Undertake subjects that are prerequisites for specific university courses.

So, with all this in mind, I encourage all girls to think about:

- What subjects do they enjoy doing?
- Will the subjects they select give them variety in their day?
- Are there prerequisite subjects required for university courses they wish to consider?

Please take the opportunity to visit the Careers Pathway website and speak to key staff at school. We are here to help, and I look forward to sharing the Senior School journey with you and your daughter(s).
