
## **Australian Mathematics Competition**

# Choosing Subjects With The Future In Mind

I hope you were able to spend some time as a family relaxing and recovering over the recent mid-year break.

As we returned to school last week, the Year 12s entered the 'premiership quarter' and have a busy term ahead. It is important that they look after themselves by eating well, ensuring they get 8 – 9 hours of sleep each night and keeping physically active. This term will pass quickly so all girls need to start the way they want to finish. After all, they only have 50 days of classes left!

This week we have begun the subject counselling process for 2023. Girls in Years 10 and 11 have met with key staff to hear about the subjects available for them to undertake next year. As your daughter completes her final year(s) at Wilderness, it is important that she considers the subjects she enjoys and any prerequisites for her future studies at university.

What I know is that the world of work has changed exponentially over the last few years. There are so many new opportunities for young women to pursue their interests and talents. My experience as Head of Senior School highlights that the most successful SACE subject patterns are where young people follow their passions, interests and strengths.

At Wilderness, girls in Year 11 and 12 have access to a broad range of choices to make sure that the pathways they pursue are flexible and open to change. Young people will change their minds, but at the same time, we want all girls to achieve the highest level of academic success possible.

This year, all girls in Year 11 and 12 will have the opportunity to meet with a wide range of teachers who are SACE subject specialists to assist them with their subject choices. Parents of Year 11 girls are encouraged to book a time to meet with staff on **Thursday 11 August** with their daughter to discuss their subjects as sent by email earlier this week. Naturally, both Mrs Caroline Palmer (Careers Counsellor) and I will always be available should you wish to meet with us to discuss subject selection more deeply.

What I would encourage all girls and their parents to do is to think outside the square and to understand that what we are doing is 'educating girls for their future and not our past' as the world of work is changing. As parents, we must be open to the fact that girls need to choose a broader range of subjects to ensure that they are prepared to do their best and to be successful in their personal and professional lives.

#### Frahns Farm Tree Planting

Year 10 Student, **Grace Munro**, recently worked with Frahns Farm Tree Planting and has shared her experience below:

I signed up for the Bio-R Frahns Farm Tree Planting for my Silver Duke of Ed service component and loved participating in the development of new habitats. Bio-R are a grassroots charity that reconstruct habitats to support native wildlife. As a community, we helped to reconstruct sufficient habitat at large scales that will meet the needs of wildlife, while also arresting their declines at this large scale.

It was a wonderful experience for the community to come together and

support a great cause. The girls and I loved planting the different species of grasses, herbs and shrubs, as well as trees. We planted them in a way that would diversify the area for multiple species to inhabit, therefore boosting the ecosystem. Although the weather wasn't pleasing, the day definitely was.

## Gold Duke of Edinburgh Students' Jatbula Trip

Two of our Gold Duke of Edinburgh students **Millie Gosse** and **Lucy Mildwaters** (Year 11) have shared their recent hiking experience in the Northern Territory.

During the school holidays, the Gold Duke of Edinburgh students embarked on a once-in-a-lifetime experience in the Northern Territory (NT): hiking the Jatbula trail, the 62km journey from Nitmiluk Gorge to Edith (Leylin) Falls.

At the time, we did not know that this would be a life-changing experience for us all, in which we strengthened and developed new relationships with our peers and immersed ourselves in the environment we were so lucky to encounter.

The experience was full of remarkable landscapes, beautiful flora and fauna, history and culture. Some of the highlights were visiting the Amphitheatre containing the remains of historical rock art, which produced a deep appreciation for the Jawoyn culture; swimming in a new rock pool each day; exploring waterfalls and relaxing in the sunshine; learning and recognising different plant and bird life in the variety of environments we passed; sleeping under the stars, staring at a clear sky and the moon; and walking as the sun rose and the life around us woke up.

Everyone faced their own individual challenges, whether that be packing their rucksacks in the morning, cooking on the Trangia or walking with painful blisters in the NT heat. These challenges taught us to persevere and to support each other through the experience and learn about ourselves, others and the environment surrounding us.

The 2022 Jatbula trip was a sensational adventure, involving the formation of new friendships, personal growth and perseverance.

I shared with our girls a story about an inspiring friend of mine who, over the holidays, placed 14<sup>th</sup> in the Women's Marathon at the World Championships. I found Sarah's approach to her run inspirational.

After several injuries, recoveries and living through the interruptions of Melbourne's COVID-19 lockdown last year, she was determined to work toward this race. Before the race she wrote on her hand, "Back yourself – make it happen." This simple phrase was a reminder that she had to be her number one supporter.

Similarly, I encouraged our girls to be their own number one supporter this term. Using a growth mindset, I have encouraged our girls to focus on a word or phrase that motivates them to believe that they CAN achieve what they set their minds to. It is a big term for our girls and especially for our Year 12 students, who embark on their final full term at Wildy.

#### Year 10 Pathways Week

Eloise Broster and Fengfan Zhang share their Year 10 Pathways Week experience:

Year 10 Pathway Week for students occurred in Week 8 of Term 2. On Monday and Tuesday, students were lucky enough to visit Flinders University (both Bedford Park and Tonsley Campuses), UniSA (CityWest and CityEast campuses) and The University of Adelaide.

We learned about university life, sat in makeshift lectures, participated in workshops and were exposed to amazing resources and facilities that will assist us with our subject and course selection moving forward.

Students were able to experience the university landscape and found hearing about pathways after school to be enjoyable and interesting. For the following three days, students were involved in an industry immersion/work experience program in a broad range of work placements, gaining a deeper and more personal insight into the ins and outs of their chosen field and better navigating our career prospects. We are very grateful for the opportunities provided during the week.

## Year 10 Work Experience

Elena Tsamaidis shares her experience at the Jam Factory:

I was fortunate enough to undertake my work experience at the Jam Factory in the Ceramics Department. I was able to interact with artists and obtain an appreciation for the various roles in a ceramics department, from Production Manager to Slip and Kiln Technician, Associates and Artists to Head of Ceramics Studio. I gained hands-on understanding of the importance of meticulous hand sanding to create a quality finish, sorting and storing of just fired products, loading products for internal transfer in readiness for sale and loading the kiln itself (now that was a real-life game of Tetris!).

In addition, I gained experience in throwing and trimming products, learning new skills from professionals in this area of art, how to price a product and an understanding of the costs apportioned to the process. A highlight was that I was able to attend a private viewing of the Waterhouse Exhibition at the SA Museum where Jam Factory artists' work is exhibited.

The placement was one of the coolest things I have ever done. The staff were positively lovely, and I enjoyed spending time with and learning from them.

#### Fengfan Zhang was fortunate to spend time at a dermatology centre:

I was fortunate enough to undertake my work experience at Windsor Gardens Dermatology, under Dr Kyoko Shirato. The specialist practice was less than a 5-minute commute along Northeast Road (which my parents loved). I started work every morning at 8.00am and left at 5.00pm. My days were spent shadowing Dr Shirato, observing her work and asking questions. I was able to spend a day observing Dr Shirato perform skin surgery in theatre.   (must graduate 2022 for 2023 entry). Subject pre-requisites have changed to
  English, Maths Methods and Biology or Chemistry or Physics.
- Bond University Subject pre-requisites have changed to English or EAL.

#### Tasmania:

 University of Tasmania – from 2023, the program will be called a "Bachelor of Medical Science and Doctor of Medicine". This replaces the "Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery". The new course has the same duration as the old course and provides an AQF Level 9 qualification, instead of a AQF Level 7 qualification.
