The SACE (South Australian Certificate of Education) Board has recently launched their 'We Are More' campaign, a pivotal component of their THRIVE strategic plan. This campaign emphasises the importance of recognising every student's unique strengths and capabilities. The overarching goal is to ensure that success metrics are not just based on traditional academic achievements, but are also in tune with the skills and attributes that will be essential for young individuals in the future.

In line with this vision, the SACE Board is working on innovative ways to holistically evaluate and celebrate the myriad of talents and abilities of students, which might not necessarily be reflected in traditional measures.

Wilderness School has been at the forefront of this educational evolution. We were honoured to be among a select group of South Australian schools invited to contribute to the 'We Are More' conference. Furthermore, our school has successfully led pilot programs in Exploring Identities and Futures (EIF) and Activating Identities and Futures (AIF) for the past two years, showcasing our commitment to this initiative.

In anticipation of this comprehensive approach to education, Wilderness School continues to actively collaborate with industry professionals. These experts are

mentoring both our students and staff, ensuring they are well-equipped to navigate the educational landscape and emerge as progressive, adaptable learners.

Wilderness School has been fostering a robust relationship with MOD. at The University of South Australia, with a special emphasis on its collaboration with Dr Kristin Alford, a renowned futurist and the Director of MOD. At the onset of the term, all teaching staff participated in an intensive day of professional learning at MOD. This session was not just an educational experience, but a deep dive into the evolving landscape of education. The day was segmented into explorations of the future of assessment, led by the Director of Learning and Teaching, Mr Brad Snell, and a comprehensive look at the implications of Artificial Intelligence on the educational sector, led by the Head of Technology and Enterprise, Mr Thomas Keller.

As the term has progressed, Dr Alford recently engaged with the Middle and Senior students during Science Week, introducing them to the intriguing world of futures and foresight. She elucidated the concept by breaking it down into four categories: Probable, Plausible, Possible and Preposterous futures. This not only broadened the students' horizons, but also equipped them with a skill set to envision and navigate the future.

Furthermore, Dr Alford's expertise has been instrumental in supporting the design and development of a new Year 9 Futures and Foresight subject. This pioneering subject demonstrates the forward-thinking approach of Wilderness School, marking it as the first of its kind in Australia.

The synergy between the school and MOD., especially with Dr Alford, is a testament to our commitment to equipping students with the tools and knowledge to shape the future.

Through collaborations such as this, we will ensure that our girls are better global citizens, critical thinkers and leaders.

## Read. Grow. Inspire... celebrating Children's Book Week 2023

Reading is a vital part of the way we experience the world and it underpins much of the learning we do. It helps us acquire information, understand the thoughts and feelings of others, develop and capture our thinking, be entertained and find out the rules and instructions we need to follow. On a screen, you might read prompts and scores as you play a game, read captions and subtitles while watching a video, follow signs and symbols using virtual reality technology or scroll through social media. When we read, we grow our thinking, understanding and hearts... and often, we may be inspired by the people and situations we encounter. This made the Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) 2023 Children's Book Week theme 'Read. Grow. Inspire.' a wonderful opportunity to engage with new Australian literature.

It is fascinating to watch the ELC and Junior School girls carefully consider the shortlisted books, chosen by adult judges, and apply their critical thinking skills to vote for the books that most appeal to them. Valuing their voice and applying democratic voting principles sets up the girls as engaged citizens.

In the lead up to Book Week, ELC to Year 3 girls explored the Book of the Year: Early Childhood shortlist and voted for their favourite. The judges chose Where the Lyrebird Lives (Vikki Conley) as their winner, while we chose Lionel and Me (Corinne Fenton) as a clear favourite. Years 4, 5 and 6 girls examined the Picture Book of the Year shortlist before voting. The official winner was My Strange Shrinking Parents (Zeno Sworder) and we decisively voted for Frank's Red Hat (Sean Avery). Once again, our student vote reflected the student panels of the CBCA shadow judging 'Sun Project', using the same criteria as the official judges to vote for winning books.

Our Book Week class activities have included seeking out puzzle pieces to reconstruct book covers, decorating envelopes to see what turned up in the 'Wildy Post' and using colour and pattern to explore our identities as citizens of Australia. Buddies have made hungry frogs, friendly dog puppets, amazing birds and gorgeous giraffes with lovely lashes. Some penguins will be getting creative hats soon, just like our visiting Emperor Penguin in the Library last week (who modelled a number of fetching options).

Our girls are convinced that Book Week is 'the parade' and it is always a delight and honour to invite them to display their imaginations and secret identities with costumes inspired by books. I think we managed to field an entire team of Matildas this year! We appreciated the opportunity to have a wonderful audience of parents, including the brave souls who took on my challenge and dressed up too!

# Fostering Leadership Skills and Resilience

One of the key capabilities we aim to cultivate in all of our girls is leadership capacity. Over the past two weeks, there has been a focus on student leadership as we elected our 2024 Student Representative Council, while the Year 10 and Year 11 girls have been involved with yLead in leadership development programs. Last week, more than 40 Year 10 girls were also involved in a five-day expedition in the Northern Ikara-Flinders Ranges, which tested their leadership and resilience. We also witnessed some exceptional leadership on the sports field as the girls took on Seymour College in the annual Winter Intercol.

While the journey toward leadership is often filled with triumphs, it is important to acknowledge that disappointments, such as not securing a student leadership position or winning an important game, can be equally transformative. Leadership is not limited to holding a title or having a tie or badge. True leadership involves guiding, inspiring and influencing others positively. It is about taking initiative, displaying empathy, communicating effectively and collaborating to achieve common goals. These skills are vital not only in academic settings, but also in the real world where adaptability and teamwork are highly valued.

Through participation in various leadership opportunities at school, girls learn to:

• Communicate: They practise articulating their ideas clearly and listening actively to

others' perspectives.

- Collaborate: They work with diverse groups, understanding the strengths of each member and learning to delegate tasks effectively.
- Problem-Solve: They encounter challenges and learn to find creative solutions, developing critical thinking skills.
- Empower Others: They inspire peers to get involved, fostering a sense of unity and shared purpose.
- Build Resilience: They learn to handle setbacks and disappointments, turning them into opportunities for growth.

As I have mentioned to all Year 11s this week, I know that inevitably some girls will be disappointed that they have missed out on formal leadership positions. It is important for girls to understand that setbacks and disappointments are an inherent part of life and that they were brave in engaging in the leadership process. Not being selected for a leadership position can be disheartening, but it is crucial to reframe this experience as a chance for personal development. Disappointment can serve as a stepping stone toward resilience, self-awareness and perseverance. It also does not mean that they are not leaders.

As a school community, we are committed to providing a supportive environment where every girl can grow. By instilling leadership skills and teaching them how to navigate disappointment, we are empowering girls to become well-rounded, resilient individuals who are prepared to face the challenges and successes that lie ahead.

In conclusion, I want to acknowledge and thank the 2023 Student Representative Council for their work and commitment to the School throughout this year, as we head to the end of their term in their respective roles. Their efforts have not gone unnoticed and are appreciated.

## Silver Duke of Edinburgh and Stage 1 Outdoor Education Camp
