EARLY LEARNING

National Science Week

The girls' interest in science peaked this week with some exciting experiments as part of National Science Week.

During the week, the girls engaged in several interesting experiments and transformed into little scientists.

The Mamie girls were deeply engaged in the re-enactment of the story 'Who Sank the Boat?' exploring the concept of floating and sinking in the outdoor water troughs. They then followed the steps of the experiments to create Magic Milk, Walking Water and Rubber Eggs.

Each investigation required the girls to record the steps and materials, make predictions, answer questions, and draw conclusions. Experiments are an exciting part of science and will inspire the girls to continue to create their own investigations through play.

In the Annie House, the girls built on their previous experiences with water and also explored the concept of floating and sinking, but extended the concept by adding salt to increase the density of the solution. This enabled some objects to float where previously they had sunk.

At the end of the week, the girls carefully observed and participated in the process of making jelly, noticing the crystals dissolving and how the jelly sets.

The girls also continued their learning about sustainability by being waste warriors;

carefully sorting their waste, creating beeswax wraps, and writing letters to Earth about how they can continue to care for our world. This learning will continue in the weeks ahead and the waste warrior initiative is already considerably reducing our waste going to landfill.

Our ELC also celebrated Book Week this week. We look forward to telling you all about the costumes and activities in the next edition.

Subject choices should be based on interest and academic stretch instead of the subjects students 'like' simply because they find them the easiest.

New York Times bestseller, David Epstein in his book 'Range' (2019), discusses the importance of 'desirable difficulties'. He states, "these are obstacles that make learning more challenging, slower, and more frustrating in the short term, but better in the long term". My advice to families is to encourage your daughter to embrace challenge and see obstacles and difficulties in their learning as positive constraints to overcome.

Epstein further highlights that when we work harder and embrace greater levels of challenge in our learning, that there is generally much higher levels of transfer and longevity in that learning. I wish all girls the best of luck with their future endeavours and have no doubt their choices will result in rewarding and meaningful learning.

Jam Factory Collaboration

A central part of the Year 9 Inspire: Creative Product Design subject is to collaborate with industry. The Jam Factory is a unique, not-for-profit organisation that supports and promotes excellence in art, craft and design through their programs, studios, galleries and shops.

In an introductory ceramics course, the Jam Factory's qualified staff have been teaching our Year 9 Students specialist skills, which they use to design and develop their own functional ceramic products in Term 4.

The completed books will be shared digitally with children in hospitals across Australia. Last Tuesday, 55 Middle and Senior School girls had the opportunity to participate in Write a Book in a Day, a fun and creative team writing competition with some unique aspects.

The girls worked collaboratively in teams of between five and ten people from 8.00am to 8.00pm. These 12 hours were spent writing a book to be shared digitally with children in hospitals across Australia.

Sponsorship money raised is donated to The Kids' Cancer Project,

a charity committed to funding research for better treatments and eventually a cure for childhood cancer. This year, the fundraising has been done online via the Write a Book in a Day website and due to the impact of COVID-19 interstate, the date for fundraising extended until 30 September. Currently, \$1000 has been raised but the aim is to increase the donation for this very worthy cause.

On competition day, the girls were challenged to write for children aged between 10 to 16 years of age. Each book needed to include special parameters such as random words and context. This year, the words were pineapple, big brother, lifesaver, family and blue bottle. Teams were given three random main characters, a setting and an event. These parameters were unique to each team and helped the team build their story. The day was spent with friends and food. It gave girls the chance to tap into their creative side – whether it was writing amazing chapters or drawing beautiful images. 
















SENIOR SCHOOL

Creative Product Design

Year 9 Inspire: Creative Product Design focuses on collaboration with the contemporary art industry. In partnering with a globally-recognised centre of excellence, the Jam Factory, we aim to provide students with the most current, unique design ideas and learn from the best emerging creative talent.

Providing students with a greater understanding of career pathways and enterprise opportunities in craft, design and arts practise in Adelaide, the visit allowed them to view artists working in the Jam Factory's four studios; metal, furniture, glass, and ceramics.

Supported by ceramic specialists, students learned specific skills in two practical sessions. This included learning the fundamental skills needed to make vessels on the pottery wheel and making flatware using slab construction and mould forming.

In a presentation by studio tenant, Xanthe Murphy, the girls gained an insight into how the organisation has supported her career and creative arts practice. Of particular interest was how the Jam Factory provided her the opportunity to collaborate with Jordan Leeflang, an emerging furniture artist, who has allowed her to grow in her arts practice. Students were also able to view the design process of her 'Tidelines' series, from conception to realisation, which will be particularly useful in their preparation for undertaking the development of their own work.

In their upcoming secondary sessions with the Jam Factory's specialist teachers, students will learn more about appropriate surface treatments of their ceramic designs. They will discuss the science of firing and glazing clay for specific purposes, including the functional properties of materials for food-based ceramic ware.

Changes to the PE Uniform

The final garment to be updated for our PE uniform is a new soft shell jacket and will be introduced in Term 1, 2022. The water-resistant jacket is complete with hood and will replace both the spray jacket and fleece jacket.

This new jacket will be available in the PE uniform blue, with grey trim across the front and back, which complements the grey in our new track pants. Stock will be delivered in March, 2022.

There will be a transition period of **two years** from the current spray and fleece jackets to the new soft shell jacket. All girls should be wearing the new jacket from the start of 2024.

Due to the introduction of the new jacket, the uniform shop is having a sale of spray jackets and fleece jackets.

These garments may be worn until the end of 2023.

Junior Fleece Jackets

Were \$45, now \$29.

All children's sizes available, except size 3C and 12C.

Spray Jackets

Were \$115, now \$69.

Children's size 8, adult size small, medium and large.
