## Celebrating the Unique Learning Experiences of our Girls

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Mastering the art of group performance and teamwork is highly prized in Australian society and globally. This is just as important as working with each girl individually, setting their personal SMART Goals. In Australian schools, there continues to be a growing emphasis on the development of student capabilities.

How do we help our girls develop these? How do we strengthen student agency in daily learning initiatives? In this newsletter, I share with you such learning experiences undertaken in Term 2 - strategically planned Wilderness activities that our students design and take part in actively as learners - either as a whole Junior School, or as a Year group.

"Market Day" involves the whole Junior School - Reception to Year 6 students; Year 2 Strings program is for all the year level; Year 4 Band program is for all the year level. Please join me in celebrating these accomplishments of our students and staff. Further, I continue to be proud of the personal best achievements of our girls as well, as outlined below.

### **Market Day**

On Friday 21 June the Year 6 students and their teachers Mrs Laura Sieradzki and Mr Kieran Jackson had converted Hender Hall into an exciting "Experiences Market" this year. The Year 6 girls had spent hours of learning time in this cross-curriculum project - linking work from their Mathematics, Humanities and Social Sciences and Digital Design

and Technology subjects.

They worked in teams of 3-4 students. They creatively planned, priced and delivered stalls ready to entice customers to part with their money to buy "Experiences". No stone was left unturned. They had thought of profitability, customer behaviour, business innovation. Their customers were the Junior School students who each were allocated a 40 minute timeslot to visit and engage in this valuable financial literacy activity.

Each year this Year 6 student agency project keeps getting bigger and better - a testament to the quality learning our younger students experience when they visit "Market Day". A big thank you to all the staff who carefully prepared our younger girls.

We were thrilled to teach the girls about money and applying the numerous general capability skills needed to be independent participants on this day. I was so proud to witness the quality learning of our girls at this event. Thank you everyone, and a special thanks to Mrs Carolyn Tasker for organising money floats and our Maintenance staff for helping move heavy furniture for this event.

### **Year 2 Strings Concert**

On Monday 17 June at 5pm our families joined our Year 2 girls to listen to their outstanding Strings performance. All our Year 2 girls undertake a compulsory semester program learning a String instrument and getting to know a range of passion for music education.

They get to experience putting on a team performance. The Wilderness Junior and Intermediate String Ensembles also performed on this evening. Research findings demonstrate learning to play a musical instrument at this pivotal age, can strengthen transferable skills that support student academic improvement and a stronger sense of wellbeing.

### **Year 7 Wellbeing Day**

In the last week of Term, the Year 7 students took part in a day long workshop run by Enlighten Education call The Butterly Effect. The girls explored a range of topics relevant to them in the sessions including critically evaluating media and social messages, reconnecting with core values and self-belief lost in adolescence, journal writing, stress management and having healthy friendships. The feedback from the day was overwhelmingly positive and it was a wonderful way for the Year 7s to reflect on their first semester in the Middle School.

“Today was fun and I learnt a lot of new things. The biggest lessons for me are don’t judge, be yourself, be kind and choose to surround yourself with people you feel comfortable with.”

“I learnt how to better look for the best not the worst in things. I learnt how to thank people and how to help ourselves when we’re stressed. My favourite part was the forever friends activities because it felt nice to say good things to each other.”

“I am really grateful that I got to be here today. I learnt a lot about stress, the good and bad. I learnt that I have a lot of friends to be grateful for. I learnt that influencers and ads

are often not realistic.”

### **Artemis - Media Smart Program**

This term as part of Artemis, Wilderness students in Year 8 will take part in the Media Smart Program- a world-renowned, body image and eating disorder program, created by Dr Simon Wilksch and Professor Tracey Wade at Flinders University.

Media Smart encourages young people to be informed so they can identify and challenge unrealistic, perfectionistic ideals perpetuated by the media. The program aims to reduce the importance placed on appearance in determining one’s self-worth.

The topics addressed in Media Smart include:

- Media literacy content on techniques used to manipulated images,
- Discussion and challenging pressures placed on young people,
- A reflection on how social is “social media”,
- Encouraging the identification of personal values,
- Reducing/increasing behaviours that lead to increased/reduced pressure,
- Role-plays on responding to unhelpful comments from peers and others, and
- Identifying helpful/unhelpful media messages.

Body Image concerns are extremely relevant for adolescent girls, with the research showing that:

- Nearly half (45%) of young people are dissatisfied with the way their body looks
- Nearly 70% of young people said they have experienced appearance-related teasing, with 73% of these saying they’d experienced it at school
- Nearly two-thirds of young people say their body image stops them from doing physical activities.

The research also showed a relationship between social media and young peoples’ feelings of dissatisfaction with their bodies, including a desire to be thinner, as well as poorer body appreciation and greater life disengagement.

We are delighted to be offering Media Smart, the leading eating disorder risk reduction

program worldwide for school classroom settings as part of our mission to enable every girl to be the best she can be throughout her life.

experiences that will remain with us all forever, including a visit to La Fenice Opera House for a guided tour and attending Aida at Verona Arena.

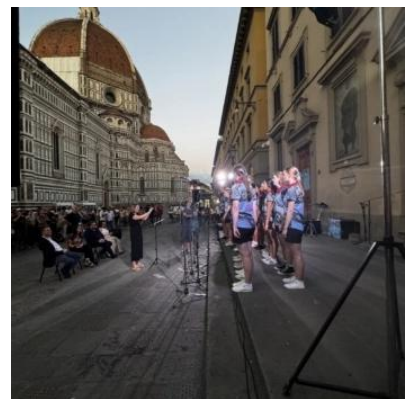

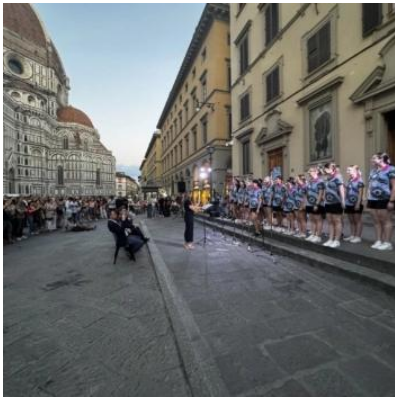

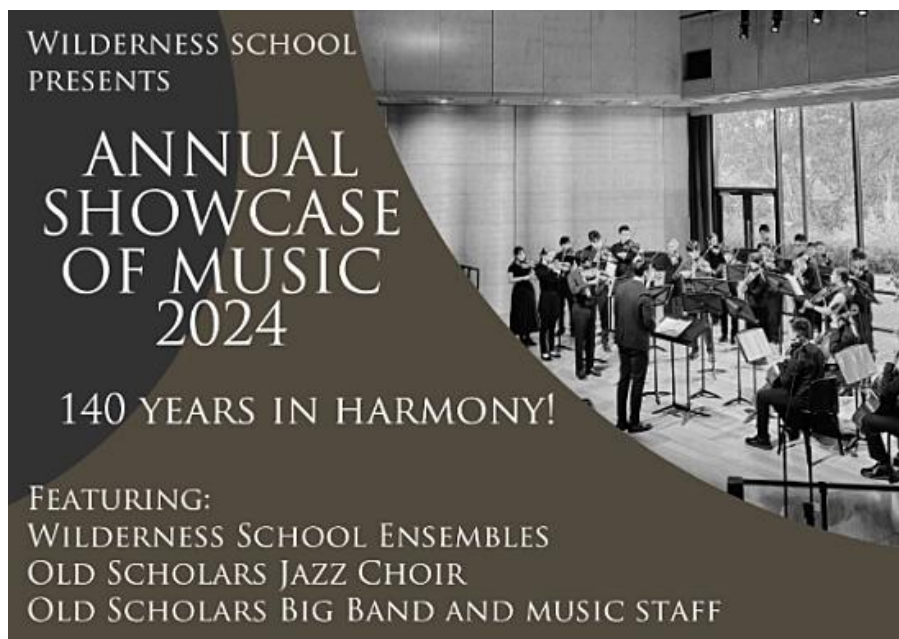
