Tournament of Minds International Final

After celebrating an exhilarating victory at the Tournament of Minds State Final in September this year, our team of seven flew to Sydney to represent South Australia in the TOM International Final. We joined 73 other winning teams, representing Australian states and territories – ACT, Western Australia, Victoria, New South Wales, Northern Territory, and Queensland – and international teams from the United Arab Emirates, Indonesia, New Zealand, and Hong Kong.

Our trip was jam-packed with unforgettable experiences, from exploring the vibrant and busy streets of central Sydney, to meeting other teams and facing the challenges on competition day. Every moment was packed with excitement and discovery.

The competition commenced on Friday with an opening ceremony and gathering of teams. The atmosphere was electric as we gathered in our red South Australia shirts as each country and state took it in turn to roar their chants. We cheered as they announced our Wilderness team, competing in the Language Literature category of the competition. Tournament of Minds fosters the ideals of teamwork, collaboration, courage, leadership and caring for the world we live in. Having the opportunity to meet other competing teams and swap badges with them, we fostered friendships that crossed borders, growing a sense of global community and understanding.

From there, we were led on a scavenger hunt all around the Sydney Harbour Precinct, and we had to use our teamwork and critical thinking skills to lead us to our next location. That day, we visited and explored numerous places, such as the Susannah Place Museum, the Sydney Harbour Bridge, and the Sydney Tower. We developed a richer knowledge of Australia's history and the world around us.

Competition day arrived and our team was transported to the Law Faculty of UNSW to begin the challenge. Given a small box of materials, a room, and 3 hours, we were tasked to make a 10-minute solution in response to a complex challenge question. The stakes were high, but we thrived under the pressure, pushing the boundaries of our teamwork and resourcefulness, and strengthening our bonds and communication. Time was ticking – but we worked together, seamlessly building ideas together and developing our time management and creativity. Then came the Spontaneous Challenge, a thrilling twist that put our skills to the test. Only given three minutes to piece together the most creative answers we could, our decision making, and improvisational skills were pushed to new heights.

Each competing team took it in turn to present their responses and we loudly cheered them on with unrestrained enthusiasm, celebrating each and every team's unique presentation. Despite competing against one another, we were united by a shared drive to innovate and create.

The atmosphere buzzed with anticipation and curiosity at the closing ceremony. Although our team did not come back with a medal, our journey felt like a victory in itself. We still believed in the meaning of what we had achieved and took pride in our work and growth over the past few days. The unforgettable experience at Tournament of Minds and

representing South Australia has strengthened our confidence and reaffirmed our belief that we can do anything if we put our minds to it.

REALISE is filled with fun and friendship and creates memories that will last a lifetime. On each day, we participate in unique and interesting experiences. These range from rock climbing in Victoria to driving a tractor, from kayaking in the Coorong to shopping in Meningie (and Kingston), and from surfing in Robe to cleaning a cabin.



Expanding Horizons through Round Square Exchanges and Experiences

Global Learning

It has been a busy year for Global Learning. Our Round Square International Exchange Program sent nine students to host schools in Japan, Canada, USA, and the UK, and our girls hosted five students from Japan, the USA and South Africa. A group of four Year 8 girls also spent five days at Rockhampton Grammar School on a regional conference where they participated in a range of adventurous activities, while making friends from around the world.

2024 also saw the return of the Nepal trip with over 30 students accompanying teachers trekking in Nepal and visiting the Bhadure School.

2025 also promises to be a busy year for our girls, with students participating in the Model United Nations being held in South Korea in February, travelling to China on the Chinese Language Tour in April, and a small group travelling to Oxford in April as well to participate in the Round Square Inspiring Voices Big Baraza debating conference.

We are also planning to invite students in Years 10 – 12 who will be at least 16 years old in 2025, to attend the Round Square International Conference being held in Dubai in September. More information about this opportunity will be available next year.

Exchanges

This term we have welcomed back Sophie and Lainie from their exchanges in the UK. Both girls had amazing, life-changing experiences. We are grateful to their host schools, Westfield School in Newcastle and Cobham Hall in Kent, for their care and support of our girls while on exchange. We are also looking forward to hosting Sophie's host sister India from the start of next year.

Please read Sophie and Lainie's reflections below:

Sophie Wheeler

In September and October of this year, I was lucky enough visit Newcastle, England while on exchange. This time that I spent was definitely one of the best and most enjoyable things I have ever done in my life. The family that I was staying with were some of the kindest and most friendly people I have ever met, and I couldn't have asked for any better. The relationships and memories that I have formed not only with my host family but with girls from both in school and out are now lifelong connections which I am so grateful for.

Being able to experience life in another country has changed my perspective on life and opportunities for the future, as it was amazing to visit part of the world so far away from what I'm used to. My time on exchange has taught me how to put myself out there when meeting new people and to not hold myself back. I was able to make so many friends while I was away who I someday want to visit again.

I honestly could not pick only one highlight from the trip; however, a main highlight of the experience would have to be all the different locations I was able to visit. Being able to travel to places outside of Newcastle such as, Edinburg, Glasgow, Leeds, the Lake District, and London were incredible. The difference in accents as you travel around the UK is something else. A few times I really had to focus to try and understand what some people were saying! I was also fortunate enough to see the Northern Lights from the front yard which was spectacular and is something I will never forget.

The time that we were at school was so much fun; it was actually very similar to Wildy. They also have house on a Wednesday and do similar work to what we do. However, the school that I was at was much smaller than Wildy, there were only 30 girls in the year level! Also, the school uniform was pink!

The experience that I had was amazing, and it wouldn't have been the same without my host family and their efforts to make me feel as at home as possible. I cannot wait for a chance when I can go back to visit. Spending time hanging around, going to the shops, driving the quadbike, or playing pool are just some of the things that made everyday life so enjoyable. I will be having my host sister India come to stay at the beginning of next year and I really hope she has as much of a good time as I did. I honestly couldn't recommend going on exchange more, it has taught me so much and has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life.

During September and October in 2024, I had the opportunity to go to England for a Round Square boarding exchange. Round Square is an internationally diverse network of 250+ like-minded schools in 50 countries on six continents that connect and collaborate to offer world-class programmes and experiences, developing global competence, character and confidence in their students. The Round Square ideals include internationalism, democracy, environmentalism, adventure, leadership, and service. They also believe that to equip their students for positive, active and engaged global citizenship they must offer them more than academic knowledge and qualifications, which includes exchange experiences.

I was fortunate to attend Cobham Hall, in Kent, an independent school for girls which is also co-educational in the sixth form (years 12 and 13). It truly was a 'once in a lifetime experience' and I thoroughly enjoyed my 6-weeks there. I am forever grateful to Wilderness School and Round Square for providing me this wonderful experience.

During my time at Cobham Hall, I participated in various boarding activities and trips where I developed strong relationships with my peers. Some more highlights from my trip include going into London to watch 'An Inspector Calls' at Alexandra Palace - it was an amazing experience watching a play in such an old theatre, spending some time in London and seeing the sights including Tower Bridge, the Tower of London, Notting Hill, Buckingham Palace, Houses of Parliament, etc, and I even watched an Arsenal vs Chelsea match, which was an awesome atmosphere. I also had the opportunity to explore the region of Kent, where I visited Rochester, Canterbury, Dover, and more. Kent has beautiful scenery, luscious landscapes and is a very historic region. I was enriched in thousands of years of history, much older than I have previously experienced. Cobham was the typical English countryside town with vast greenery and at certain times of the day, the sun lights up the surroundings in the most magical way.

My time away highlighted the importance of respectful relationships, community and everlasting friendships. An experience that emphasised this was when I attended a Rotary International meeting with the Gravesend and Meopham Rotary Club. I felt very proud to be following in the footsteps of my family legacy, with their long-time involvement in Rotary International. I was invited by a fellow Rotarian from the Rotary Club of Greenwich to attend. I had the honour of ringing the bell to commence the meeting and had the pleasure of wearing the presidential neck ribbon with all the past presidents' badges. In addition, I was able to gain further insight into the history of Cobham Hall and its connection to Rotary, as the club holds their annual ball in the Gilt Hall. 

Deepening Understanding through First Nations Histories and Perspectives

Educating our young people about the histories of First Nations people is an opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of cultural diversity and why it plays such a significant part in the Australian narrative and our understanding of others.

Year 8 students were fortunate to work with Dr. Jennifer Caruso as part of a Merge unit involving the studies of English and Artemis. Jennifer is an Eastern Arrente woman and a survivor of the Stolen Generations. She is a lecturer at the University of Adelaide, specialising in Australian Aboriginal History, examining the public and social policies that informed the removal of Aboriginal children during the assimilation era. Jennifer's engaging presentation invited us on a journey through the challenges and responses to discrimination, assimilation, and the ongoing aspiration for equitable and appropriate recognition of First Nations people. Students also engaged with the film 'Remembering Country', which shares the story of Harold Furber's experiences through the use of slides and old moving footage taken by the missionaries.

This engagement with First Nations perspectives and experiences will shape students' creation of a visual text with a supporting justification that focuses on an aspect of First Nations representation including education, health and healing, spirituality, and culture. The ability for our students to reflect on their learning and contextualise this in relation

to our School's values is beneficial to enriching their capacities as responsible citizens.

Niya Singhal, Shayla Retnaraja, Felicia Xing, Evelyn McArdle, Lucy Claughton, Jemimah Satchell and Mrs Palmer had the amazing opportunity to visit the Supreme Court on Tuesday 19 November 5.30pm – 6.30pm to attend the ADC's annual Alternative Dispute Resolution Address, presented this year by Dr. Peter Kassapidis, Adjunct Lecturer at the University of Adelaide. We were fascinated by his take on ADR's role in the shifting legal landscape, as a financially accessible and time-efficient method of resolving civil disputes. Dr. Kassapidis highlighted how ADR empowers parties to retain control over their decisions, rather than having a third party resolve the dispute for them.

This prestigious event was attended by school students, barristers, lawyers, and Alternative Dispute Professionals, creating an enriching environment for discussion and learning. The topics and questions raised during the address were thought-provoking and illuminated ADR's relevance in a rapidly changing world. We were particularly intrigued by Dr. Kassapidis' predictions for the future, where he foresees ADR advancing further to resolve disputes more effectively.
