Our adventurous spirit shone brightly in the younger years as our Year 3 students embarked on their Outdoor Education Camp to Blanchetown. Our Year 6 cohort then took on the challenge of their Outdoor Education Camp, which included an unforgettable bike-riding journey through the Fleurieu Peninsula. With the coastline stretching beside them and the encouragement of friends close at hand, the

girls demonstrated remarkable perseverance, teamwork and joy. Outdoor Education at Wilderness is always more than an excursion; it is an opportunity for girls to stretch their comfort zones, discover their strengths and connect with the natural world. This year's experience was no exception.

"Our team members felt butterflies in their stomachs, since this was the first State Final Robotics Competition the school has entered. Our team captains, Sirui and Nidhi, gave us a pep talk to do our best and savour this experience. They assured us that we would do really well and our optimism worked. With excellent teamwork with other schools, we achieved high scores of 135 and 108, placing us 5th out of 24 teams. We found a few errors in the coding criteria, but that didn't stop us and we tried other codes. We performed well on the other criteria, including the interview. We enjoyed representing the school, learned more about the DTE career path, and learnt the importance of teamwork, problemsolving and resilience. This is one of the best and most unforgettable events I have ever had."
