Our student population in 2021 comprised of local, rural and interstate pupils as well as international students from mainland China and Hong Kong.

Located in Medindie, 5 kilometres from the Adelaide Central Business District, our beautiful grounds provide a serene setting for learning. Wilderness School is a learning community and a community of learners that provides opportunities for girls and teachers to be creative, to interrogate information and to develop critical thinking skills and resourcefulness as well as how to develop and apply their thinking in different contexts.

Wilderness is a non-selective School that welcomes students with diverse learning needs and abilities. The literacy and numeracy difficulties experienced by a small number of students are well understood and are addressed with individual learning plans.

SENIOR SECONDARY SCHOOL OUTCOMES

Once again our students have achieved excellent results. There were 89 girls who applied for the ATAR this year.

Of the cohort, 67% were placed in the top 10%, with 52% in the top 5% and 17% in the top 1% of Year 12 students nationally. The median ATAR achieved was 95.5.

The position of Dux is shared by two outstanding students Ella Beinssen and Hamayel Abaid, who each achieved an ATAR of 99.95.




55% OF OUR YEAR 12 STUDENTS WERE PLACED IN THE TOP 5% NATIONALLY




74% OF OUR YEAR 12 STUDENTS WERE PLACED IN THE TOP 10% NATIONALLY
